No North Fork Franchise.

What will be good news to all timber holders along the North Fork and its tributaries was the decision Wednesday of the state land board in regard to the petition of the Idaho River Improvement Co. for a franchise for the improvement of the North Fork for logging purposes.

This petition has been before the state board for over a year now and aroused much opposition in all of north Idaho. The people here recognizing it as a great grafting scheme, there being no necessity for the improvement of the North Fork for any such purpose as set forth in the petition.

Petition after petition was sent in to the state land board in opposition to it and that body sent state engineer Darlington to investigate both the need and feasibility of the scheme. After careful investigation this officer brought in an adverse report this week which after going somewhat into details concludes as follows:

"I do not consider the granting of this franchise as asked for on the plans and specifications submitted, as a necessity for the development of the lumber industry in that region, nor will a refusal to grant it impede the development of the country in any way."

On the hearing of this report the board denied the petition forthwith and their decision will cause universal joy over all this section of Idaho. For a time it looked as though the petition would be granted and the decisions as given will come as an agreeable surprise to those who looked for the opposite. The application for franchise was filed by Franchise Jenkins, B. F. O'Neil, G. G. Fickett, H. Smith Woolley and others.

The city council met in regular session Wednesday evening, Jan. 6th with Mitcham, Bibb, Crocker and Hull present. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved after which the following bills were allowed: J. W. White, \$4; J. F. Brown, \$41.99; J. W. Davis, \$8.20; Charles Weber, \$12.78; John Sandberg \$40; Gazette, \$2.22; T. B. West, \$5; D. S. Hunter, \$13.54; H. P. Hull \$4; McCrea Bros. & Co, \$13.95; Mrs. Helms, \$5; D. B. Mackintosh, \$5.

On motion the rules were suspended and ordinance No. 26, elsewhere published, relating to horses and mules being left on any of the streets or alleys over a certain length of time or beyond a certain hour was read the first time in full, the second time by title and a third time in full and finally passed, all members of the council voting in the affirmative.

The chairman introduced the water question which was discussed in an informal way by the members and also their attorney in the case, W. E. Stillinger and T. E. West. It was decided to let matters proceed and secure the decision of the court on the demurrer filed by the defendant company which should be given this week, after which the council would decide what best to do.

On motion the council then adjourn
