THE WILY AGENT VICTIMIZES FARMERS

Agents who claim they are represen-
ting reliable houses in Portland and
Seattle are working a clever scheme to
defraud the farmers.

Their game is to call on him and
introduce themselves as representing
a certain company, and solicit orders
for Tea, Coffee, Spice etc.

After the agent has obtained a
goodly supply of orders he returns to
the city to have them filled. As a
matter of fact he has been sent out by
an unscrupulous house to sell their
goods under a special brand.

These goods are of such inferior
and adulterated stuff as to be unfit
for human consumption.

The orders for coffee are filled at a
wholesale price of 13 cents a pound—
the farmer paying 35 cents per pound,
a profit of 22 cents on every pound,
or \$5.50 for every 25 pound order.
Orders for spices and extracts are filled
in the same proportions.

It is an easy graft to work, for the
farmer has a foolish old fashioned no-
tion that he is being overcharged by
the local merchant of his town, and
thinks that he has an opportunity
"to get back."

As a matter of fact it is a pernicious
form of highway robbery. For not
only is the farmer robbed but the
local merchant is defrauded of the
trade that legitimately belongs to him.

The money that rightfully belongs
to the town and community is taken
away from it.

The harm done is unlimited. We
can only warn those interested to
watch out for these wolves in dis-
guise.

Buy your staples from a reliable

assured that the article you buy is
pure and wholesome and that money
has been spent on their production.

These "fly-by-night," box-car op-
erators or whatever you choose to
call them, are easily recognized for,
like the mosquito and other blood
suckers they always appear in the
