GO TO THE FAIR

Lewiston Military Band
Represent the State at
Portland Fair

A letter received yesterday from Boise states that the outlook for a state appropriation to send the Lewiston Military band to the Lewis and Clark exposition to represent the state in the Idaho building, is very encouraging, and it is expected that the appropriation will be secured without trouble. The Lewiston band stands without a competitor as the best amateur musical aggregation in the northwest, and it seems to be particularly appropriate to send to the exposition such a musical organization from the town named in honor of one of the men for whom the great fair is to be given. The Lewiston band has been preparing for several months for an engagement at the Portland exposition, and has made rapid progress during the past few months. The plan of sending the band to Portland as a representative of the state was conceived several months ago and the matter has been before the representatives of Nex Perce county since their election.

The information received from Boise last night was received with much satisfaction by the Lewiston business men and the report has met with favor in all parts of the city. The band will be composed of thirty pieces and the assembling of the musicians has been the work of the past eighteen months. Director Pollard states that three high class musicians are due to arrive in the city within the next few weeks to make permanent homes here. The expense to be met in sending the band to Portland will be included in the general state appropriation made for the state exhibit.

Owing to the bitter opposition as expressed by the business men meetings in the different towns tributary to the timber belt the Weyerhaeuser Co. have decided not to force the subject upon either the people or the state legislature but allow the matter to drift until a more opportune time.

No doubt the Big Lumber Corporation is sincere in its statements but it is also undoubtedly looking out for its own interests but we and many other small holders of land and timber adjacent to the Weyerhaeuser holdings believe that the extension of time for removing timber as asked for instead of being a benefit to all concerned would retard and delay the development and growth of the sections mentioned.
