Fiercewardfare Election Day

From Which the Republicans Issued Victorious

Only two Democrats Elected

The polls closed Tuesday night after a hard fought contest not only here but in every precinct, and the returns now coming in show that while the republicans are again in the saddle the majorities are so heavily cut that the contest is neck to neck.

Election Day was a fairly good one, the rain holding off until after 6 o'clock when a downpour began, which has, with one intermission, steadily continued.

The election results in this and the surrounding precincts we give in full, and the estimates in the others, as well as the latest estimates on the state, and the verdict of the polls in the other states.

The Latest on Latah as a Whole Are

Latah county gives the state ticket the following votes: French 2531, Hattabaugh 1863, Gooding 2226, Stockslager 1553; Burrill 2420, Chapin 1461, Lansdon 2001, Galloway 1841, Bragow 2220, Bennett 1585, Hastings 2143, Morris 2034, Cohen 2247, Payne 1808, Chamberlain 2427, French 1712, Bell 2260, Garlitz 1464, Stewart 2004, Denning 1816.

The majorities on the county ticket are: Senate, Truitt, republican, 433; legislature, Wessis, republican, 651; legislature, Mullaney, republican, 442; Jones, republican, 520, sheriff, Keane democrat, 220; auditor, Thompson, democrat, 31; assessor, Gemmill, republican, 392; superintendent of schools, Bryden, republican, 516; Steele, McCarter and Stillinger were not opposed commissioner, Lamb, republican, 460; Hagan, republican, 595; Cook republican, 508.

Returns are not in from Boulder, White Pine and Mountain Meadow.

Lewiston, Ida. Nov. 7.—

Thirty one out of 38 precincts in Nez Perce county give Governor Gooding a majority of 950. The entire republican state, legislative and county ticket is elected by safe majorities, excepting sheriff, county attorney and county commissioner. The precincts to be heard from can not do more than change the majorities slightly.

Returns from 31 precincts follow:

Congressman—French, republican 2518; Hattabaugh democrat, 1704, Governor—Gooding, republican, 2699; Stockslager, democrat, 1749.

Treasurer—Hastings, republican 2218; Morris, democratic, 2019.

The remainder of the state ticket is in about the same ratio.

State senator—Waldroy, republican 432 majority.

Legislators—Branley, 206 majority; Smith, 253; Miles, 239; Brooks, 244; Anderson, 379; all republicans.

Sheriff—Lydon, 354, democrat; Clerk distric court—Gifford, 784, republican; county treasurer—Hineky, republican, 387; county assor—Williams, republican, 225; probate judge—Hanlon, republican, no opposition; county superintendent of schools—McCoy, republican, 415; county attorney—Needham, democrat, 105; coroner—Cessar, republican, no opposition; county commissioners—McCormack, democrat, 320; Davis, republican, 368; Watson, republican, 276; Coburn, republican, 298.
