Majorities of Republican Candidates are Given.

ALL AMENDMENTS DEFEATED

No. 6 Seems to Have Made Closest Run—Socialist and Prohibitionist Vote.

Boise, Idaho, Nov. 22.—The Statesman has gathered the results of the canvass of votes of the recent election by the county commissioners. The following show the figures:

Governor—Frank R. Gooding, 38,286; C. O. Stockslager, 29,486. Gooding's plurality, 8,800.

Supreme Judge—George H. Stewart, 42,504; S. S. Denning, 22,821. Stewart's plurality, 19,683.

Congressman—Burton L. French, 42,339; M. R. Hattabaugh, 23,805. French's plurality, 18,534.

Secretary of State—Robert Lansdon, 38,024; A. F. Galloway, 26,860. Lansdon's plurality, 11,164.

Attorney General, J. J. Guheen, 40,745; Karl Paine, 24,128. Guheen's plurality, 16,617.

Treasurer—C. A. Hastings, 40,820; J. B. Morris, 24,451. Hastings' plurality, 17,369.

Auditor—Robert Bragaw, 41,036; John M. Bennett, 23,965. Bragaw's plurality, 17,071.

School Superintendent—Belle Chamberlain, 41,063; Permeal French, 23,387. Chamberlain's plurality, 17,676.

ed 4,744 votes for governor and Thos. Tuttrell, prohibitionist, 1,019. The close contest was on amendment No. 6, which fixes the limit of levy for state purposes at 10 mills. It seemed to have carried, but returns tonight defeat it by 185 votes, the vote standing "yes," 20,215; "no," 20,400. This is complete count. All the other amendments were defeated by large majorities.
