It was found that Mr. Harbison had been a very liberal provider and secure in the fact that he was young and making money, spent all he earned— But death came and left his family totally unprovided for and with habits of luxury that make them unfitted to combat with poverty. — Urbana Journal

Had Mr. Harbison instead of living up all his income to make life pleasant for his wife and children, used that portion of it spent for luxuries, to pay the premium on a thousand dollar life insurance policy, how differently his family would now be situated. Such incidents as the above are far too common, and such neglect of ordinary precaution to secure ones family from want, can fairly be called "Criminal neglect".
