

Utilities Board Coming North

Members of the Commission Will Hold a Hearing at Kendrick January 15

Boise, Ida., Dec. 23.—(Special.) The Idaho public utilities commission will visit the north next month and will be at Kendrick on January 15 to hear evidence in a water complaint. The commission has fixed dates for hearings in several parts of the state as follows:

At Wallace, Jan. 18—Washington Water Power company versus Montana Power company et al.

At Rupert, Jan. 4—Wiseman versus Rupert Electric company.

At Coeur d'Alene, Jan. 21—City of Coeur d'Alene versus interstate Utilities commission.

At Idaho Falls, Jan.—Application of J. A. Jones and William D. Wilcox to conduct gas plants at Idaho Falls.

At Kendrick, Jan. 15—Village of Kendrick versus Kendrick Water & Power company.

At Boise Dec. 27—Rehearing case of Swan Creek Electric company on application for a certificate of public convenience and necessity.

Summary of Personal Property

The summary of the personal property tax in Nez Perce county has been completed by County Auditor R. N. Wright and shows the amount of the 1915 personal property taxes collected by Assessor A. H. Hazen to have been \$11,365.33. The total personal property tax roll amounted to \$22,706.08 but of this amount \$8,285.75 was attached to the real property roll and will be paid with the real estate taxes while \$755 was cancelled by the coming commissioners upon showing by those taxed.

The total value of the personal property in Nez Perce county is reported as \$779,683.50, but of this amount \$284,855.50 is attached to the personal property and \$40,000 was cancelled for good and sufficient reasons, leaving a net valuation of \$454,828.50 from which the personal tax reported collected was assessed.

One division of the tax summary shows the value of the personal property within the Lewiston independent school district to be \$501,588 as compared with \$278,095.50 for the remainder of the county. The valuation outside the Lewiston district is further divided as follows: Rural High school district No. 1, \$42,585; rural high school district No. 2, \$12,115.

The division of the personal property valuations in the Lewiston Orchards highway district to be \$43,975; Waha-Trammany highway district, \$18,720; remaining districts of the county, \$218,235.50; this latter amount will be materially reduced when the personal property in the Lewiston highway district is deducted.

The valuations in the cities and towns are given as follows: Lewiston, \$447,023; Lapwai, \$15,225; Culdesac, \$12,155; Gifford, \$21,800; Peck, \$7,550.

As before shown a large per cent of the personal property tax has been attached to the real property tax so that the net valuation from which the taxes collected were assessed amounted to \$11,365.33 and were divided as follows: State and county, \$3,838.72; district schools, \$3,541.93; district roads, \$474.41; cities, \$3,426.18; predatory animal fund, \$84.09.

The amounts to be raised by the personal property tax as is shown by the roll before the attachments with the real property roll are: State \$3,448.42; county, \$2,780.96; district schools, \$6,283.94; district roads, \$662.62. Cities: Lapwai, \$137.03; Culdesac, \$182.33; Gifford, \$109; Peck, \$60.40; Lewiston, \$6,705.35; predatory animal fund, \$91.35; total, \$20,706.08.

Fix Terms For District Court

Moscow, Dec. 24.—The business of the district court during the present week is light, but Judge Steele anticipates that what slight equity matters are to be disposed of will be cleared from the calendar shortly after the holidays. Judge Steele in court this morning made an order fixing the dates for holding the terms of the court in the second judicial district during 1916. Contrary to custom Judge Steele has fixed his opening term for the new year at Lewiston instead of at Grangeville and plans to call a jury during that term which will begin January 17. The court will be absent from Latah county for three months, expecting to convene the first Latah term on April 24th. The following is the order fixing the terms in the district as announced by Judge Steele today:

"It is hereby ordered that the terms of court for the above district be held at the following times and places, at the county seats of the respective counties above named:

"At Lewiston, Nez Perce county; January 17, April 3, and October 23.

"At Grangeville, Idaho county; February 7 and August 28.

"At Nezperce, Lewis county, March 6 and September 25.

"At Orofino, Clearwater county, March 20 and October 9.

"At Moscow, Latah county; April 24 and November 27."

1913 Delinquent Tax Certificate

The Two Year Redemption Period Expires on Same January 10th

The County Records at this time show that about the total number of One Hundred Forty (140) Delinquency Tax Certificates are still outstanding on various Real Property in Latah County for the year of 1913, and as the Two Year Redemption Period will expire on said Tax Certificates on the second Monday of the coming January, it stands all Real Property Holders of the County in hand to look closely at their Tax Notices received for this year, 1915, as the Tax Collector is required to make notation of any outstanding Tax Certificates on the Tax Notices of Real Property sent out for the current year, and you will find notice of same, if any, at the foot of your tax notice for the year of 1915, also you received notice of the 1913 delinquency certificates on your 1914 Tax Statements, thus making the notice you are receiving this year the Second and Last Notice until said Certificates for 1913 are foreclosed as required by law, and when foreclosure proceedings are filed the cost of redemption will be greatly increased as the law provides that same must be foreclosed in exactly the same manner as foreclosure of mortgages and a \$25.00 Attorney Fee, besides sheriff's fee for serving summons and publishing same, will be added to the cost of redemption.

We would advise that every Real Property owner of Latah county dig up his, or her, tax Notice for the year of 1915 and look closely at the bottom of said notice for any mention of outstanding Tax Certificates, and if mention of same is found, write at once for the amount necessary to redeem same; also if your 1913 Tax Receipt are not found in your files, write at once, giving the description of your property, to know if any back Tax Certificates are outstanding for the year of 1913.
