### Dill Pickles

Soak medium size cucumbers 12 to 24 hours, in salt water that will float an egg. Remove from brine and pack in glass jars, alternating with a layer of dill and a layer of white mustard seed. Care should be taken not to allow pickles to lay against the side of the jar, as this forms an air chamber and causes them to spoil. Fill just full enough to allow them to shake loosely in jar. Heat to boiling, very weak vinegar—about one-third vinegar and two-thirds water—adding one cupful sugar to two gallons of vinegar, pour this over pickles and seal. These will keep indefinitely.—Kansas Farmer.
