

Finishing Celery.

The time to begin earthing up is at the approach of cool weather, about the 1st of September. The first earthing up is called "handling," the soil being first drawn up against the plant with the hoe and then further drawn closer around each plant with the hand. Handling brings stalks together, keeping them upright. Later more

soil is drawn against the row by the plow hoe or celery tiler. The final earthing is commonly done with a spade, where small lots are grown, but can be done with a celery hiller. The soil should be carried nearly to the top of the plant, so that only the leaves show, as in the illustration. The best way to keep celery in the winter is to store it in a deep trench in the same position as when growing, the plants being crowded closely together, the tops above the ground, and covered with litter enough to prevent freezing. The soil where the trench is dug should be dry and dug not more than a foot wide and as deep as the plants require. No earth is put on the roots in the trench and nothing but litter on top.
