DUBOIS AFTER THE MORMONS

Idaho's Senator Will Introduce a New Marriage Law This Session

He also will work for a law to disfranchise Mormons on the ground that they have taken an oath paramount to their oath of allegiance.

Coroner Critizes Big Four Officials for Recent Wreck at Indianapolis

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 6.—The coroner at noon today after hearing more evidence on the fatal Purdue wreck, forecasted the verdict by criticizing the Big Four officials. He said that the engineer was not altogether to blame as the superintendent had allowed him only five minutes to go two miles in the heart of the city where the law only allows a four mile speed. ARBITRATION IS A FARCE

German Newspapers Claim this of the Hague Tribunal in Venezulian Claim

BERLIN, Nov. 6.—German newspapers favor the withdrawal of the German Venezuelan claim from The Hague tribunal. The Zeitung today says that the proposed arbitration is a farce and that President Menavieff of The Hague tribunal shows strong anti-German bias and has insulted the German representative; also that the Belgium and French representatives mock the Germans. The latter are therefore urged to withdraw from the clownish proceedings as no good results can possibly come when the members of the tribunal are in such a state of mind as is shown by their present attitude so clearly inimical to the claims of Germany.


