WHO IS TO GET THE MONEY

Estate of a Suicide Depends Upon a Close Technical Question

SANTA FE, N. M., Nov. 12.—The estate of the late A. P. F. Coape, the alleged English lord, who killed himself, his wife and sister-in-law on October 4th at Lumberton, is appraised at \$101,000.

Certain diamonds which Coape was known to have had, have disappeared, either taken when the bodies were discovered or disposed of by Coape, possibly in contemplation of suicide, although their disappearance is the foundation for the rumor that the family was murdered by an outsider bent on robbery.

A very close question exists as to

whether Coape or his wife died first, on which depends the descent of the property left, and it is the contention on the part of Mrs. Coape's relatives that she survived her husband, while the opposite theory is held by Coape's relatives.

SPECIAL MEETING OF THE COUNCIL

Held Tonight for the Purpose of Passing on Today's Investigation

The members of the city council accompanied by the mayor and city engineer went on a tour of inspection on Normal Hill today to check up the alleged irregularities of the work on the Normal Hill sewer. They took picks and shovels and went into the trenches.

The result of the trip is that they found many irregularities in the lines charged at last night's meeting, i. e., house laterals were not laid up to the property lines; sewer pipe not properly cemented; the ground not tamped one foot above the sewer pipe; pipes have not been kept clean, etc.

A special meeting of the council has been called by Mayor Kress and the report will be discussed at length by the council.

CUBA MAKES AN OFFER

If Accepted the Government of Gauntamo Will Pass to United States

HAVANA, Nov. 12.—The Cuban government today handed to United States Commissioner Squires a proposition which, if accepted by the United States, will result in the immediate turning over of the Guatamo government to the United States.

The turnover includes the public ground and the portions purchased by the Cuban government, but does not include the parcels still unacquired. The United States will have immediate control of large areas of land on both sides of the bay, inclusive of the entrance, on which the lights, etc., are situated, and all the private properties within the area will be purchased on terms practically agreed upon, excepting that of the Cuban Eastern railroad, a new company, which is seeking permission to establish a terminus within the area.
