## COW BOYS GATHERING TO STORM THE JAIL

### Two Full Companies of Cavalry and Infantry Guard the Place, and Cannon Will Be Used in Defense

(Special Telegram to Evening Teller.)  
CHEYENNE, Nov. 19.—Excitement is intense here this morning. Soldiers with cannon surround the court house and jail where Horn is confined. Orders have been issued to shoot to kill all who fail to halt when commanded. Deputies from the near-by towns are flocking in and the militia will prevent any attempt of Horn's friends to rescue him. Serious trouble is expected tonight as the city is filled with strangers. Horn is so confident he will be released that he refuses to accept the offices of a priest.

#### Governor's Life Threatened

(Special Telegram to Evening Teller.)  
CHEYENNE, Nov. 19.—Governor Chatterton received a letter today threatening his death within twenty-four hours after Horn was hanged. It was written to attempt to force pardon for Horn. The cowboys are gathering for an attack on the Laramie county jail and

the guards have been strengthened. Two full companies of cavalry and infantry are now camped about the court house. If the attack comes the battle will be a bloody one. Horn will be shot in his cell by the guards stationed for that purpose if the attacking party succeeds in storming the jail. The hanging is set for eleven o'clock tomorrow morning.

#### CONDEMN GOVERNOR PEABODY

### Colorado Labor Leaders Criticize Governor's Action in Calling Troops

DENVER, Nov. 19.—Labor leaders are indignant over the governor's actions in calling federal troops to Telluride, where the strike has been on since July. They say there has not been one act of violence in Telluride or one case of assault in Cripple Creek. They declare Peabody's scheme involves the Roosevelt labor dispute and is used for political purposes.

## ROCKAFELLERS IN CONTROL

### Own Practically the United States Steel Stock and Are Trying to Buy Their Competitors

YOUNGSTOWN, O., Nov. 19.—Prominent financiers believe now that the Rockefeller's are supposed to be practically in control of the United States Steel corporation and that negotiations for the purchase of the Republic Iron Steel company, the largest independent competitor of the trust from Guthrie is playing a prominent part in their plans.

## ROOSEVELT SAYS NO

### Has No Authority to Send Troops to Colorado on the Showing of the Governor

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—President Roosevelt after a long conference with Secretary Root today decided to deny Governor Peabody's request to send federal troops to the Colorado mining districts. Under the law the president can only send troops when the violence is beyond the control of state troops and the police and then can act only on the request of legislature or upon the governor's request if it is impossible to get the legislature together. The president and Secretary Root hold that there is no insurrection in Colorado.

## INVESTIGATION OF GEN. WOOD BEFORE SENATE COMMITTEE

### Senator Hanna Attacked Wood's Conduct as Military Governor of Cuba Especially in the Rathbone Case

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—Investigation of General Wood's conduct while acting as military governor of Cuba and hearing objections to his nomination to be major general began this morning in the senate committee on military affairs. Senator Hanna was the first witness before the military committee. He attacked Wood and declared he had used his influence to persecute Rathbone. Wood was as extravagant as Rathbone

yet the latter was convicted on that charge alone. And by Wood's direction. This abuse of power Hanna contended was sufficient to show that Wood was not fit for his high office. Senator Teller and Rathbone were present as witnesses. After considerable discussion it was decided the hearing should be regarded as executive business and all but members of the committee were requested to leave the room. The further proceedings were behind closed doors and the witnesses are waiting their call.

## NO DESIRE TO PROSECUTE

### Family of Dissipated Young Millionaire Make No Attempt to Hold His Murderer

ST. JOSEPH, Nov. 19.—Joseph Furlong was released this morning after being held until the prosecuting attorney became convinced that the McDonald family had no desire to prosecute him for killing the young millionaire, Irving McDonald. Furlong and McDonald had been making a night of it with the girls of a gayety company and in a drunken brawl in the early morning hours McDonald was shot. Furlong drew a gun and McDonald dared him to shoot. He pulled the trigger shooting McDonald through the heart.

### James Lynch Will Pay the Death Penalty on January 3, but King Goes Free

SALT LAKE, Utah, Nov. 19.—Judge Booth, this morning sentenced James Lynch, to be shot January third. The case against Robert King was dismissed. Both men had been sentenced to death for holding up a gambling house here and shooting Godfrey Prowse, the proprietor, two years ago. The case was appealed to the supreme court and a new trial ordered for King. King comes from a prominent Italian family and the ambassador at Washington took up his case about a year ago.

## ALLEN CRAZED THROUGH DRINK

### Son of Former Senator Allen Goes Insane on the Streets of Spokane

SPOKANE, Nov. 19.—John B. Allen of Seattle, a son of ex-Senator Allen, went suddenly insane on the street here at noon today.

Allen stopped several people on the streets and asked them foolish questions. He attempted to quarrel with a number of persons whom he stopped and engaged in conversation.

When arrested Allen drew a knife upon the officers, but was restrained from inflicting any injury.

Allen has been in Spokane for a week on a protracted spree, though he was sober when arrested today.

## STRIKERS GAIN GROUND AND ASK ARBITRATION

### Mayor of Chicago and Aldermanic Mediation Board Put the Matter Strongly to the Railway Officials

CHICAGO, Nov. 19.—The union teamsters this morning joined hands with the strikers, sixty walking out of the Chicago City railway car barns. Every member of the organization will refuse to handle supplies for the company. This action was sanctioned by the council of the teamsters union held last night.

Mayor Harrison this morning renewed his efforts to end the trouble. The aldermanic mediation committee and railway officials are arranging another conference. The mediation board says it is up to the Chicago City railway company as the strikers practically announce that the wage scale will not stand in the way of settlement, nor do they demand a complete unionism of the road.

They do insist, however, that the routing of the cars shall be changed so men will not have to put in from ten to twenty hours each day waiting about the barns in an effort to make ten hours of actual running time.

The Sunday union mass meeting is expected to be the greatest demonstration ever held in Chicago. Every union in the city will participate. The parade

will march from headquarters headed by bands to Tattersalls. The object of this monster meeting is to obtain the voice of the entire labor element on the strike question and the municipal ownership of the city's street railways.

Late this forenoon it was announced that the freight handlers and wholesale grocers would probably agree on refusing to handle goods destined for the street railway.

A carload of strike breakers arrived today from St. Louis and cars were started on the Halsted street line this morning. Five hundred policemen guarding them. There was some disorder about the barns and the police feared trouble as the line runs through a particularly tough district.

Mayor Harrison admitted that nothing was being gained toward the strike settlement and that he had almost abandoned hope. The steam railways believe the strike will be prolonged and every available coach and locomotive is being prepared for the suburban service.

Governor Yates in interview here today admitted that eight thousand troops could be put in Chicago within twenty-four hours. Such a plan for protection had been made recently for a contingency which may confront the authorities before the week ends.

## CARRIE NATION VISITS THE NATIONAL CAPITAL

### Secretary Loeb Is Compelled to Call the Officers to Eject Her from the White House this Morning

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—Carrie Nation was forcibly ejected from the White house this morning after endeavoring to force her way in to the presence of the president.

She entered at ten and Secretary Loeb explained that the president was busy.

She sat down for half an hour and made a running comment on the other visitors who entered. Finally she walked into Loeb's office and it is said demanded to see the president immediately as she wanted to ask him why he brought a dive into Kansas when he took his western tour.

Secretary Loeb after a vain attempt to pacify her, called two officers who were compelled to drag the smasher out, as she resisted to the utmost. She created a scene in the street afterward by praying for the election of a prohibition president who represented the people and not the brewers. Mrs. Nation came here from Baltimore last night where her troupe is playing Ten Nights in a Bar Room.

Carrie Nation was later arrested for disorderly conduct in selling souvenirs in the senate gallery and was taken to the Sixth precinct station in the patrol wagon. In her harangue she accused Roosevelt of smoking a nasty cigarette on the capitol steps at Topeka.
