

GIRLS MUST NOT ROOM NEAR MEN

New Rules for Co-Eds at Chicago University.

Chicago, Dec. 29.—Rules that the deans of women at state universities would like to see observed by the girls attending these schools were prepared yesterday. The deans ended their conference here by drawing up resolutions embodying the results of their deliberations. The points brought out in these resolutions follow:

"That private houses in which women students lodge should be supervised personally by the dean, and that only such houses should be placed on the list as rent no rooms to men students and furnish a reception-room on the first floor.

"That physical training should be required of all women students and that the latter should not take part in public athletic contests.

"That all social affairs, with two possible exceptions, should close at midnight; there are too many social affairs.

"That there are sororities, there should be a large number; excessive 'rushing' is condemned.

"That the segregation of classrooms is condemned.

"That residence halls of moderate size are advisable for women students."

Mrs. Myra Jordan, dean at the University of Michigan, was chosen chairman of a committee to arrange for the next conference to be held at Ann Arbor at a date not yet selected.

STONEBURNER IS DENIED DIVORCE

Supreme Court Makes Final Decision in Case.

Boise, Idaho, Dec. 28.—The supreme court has handed down a decision reversing the judgment of the district court of Nez Perce county granting a divorce to Dr. Joseph W. Stoneburner of Leland from his wife Abbie. The court says that the divorce is for innocent persons, and should not be granted when it shows that the plaintiff is guilty of such an offense against the marriage contract as is charged against the defendant. The evidence is found to be insufficient to sustain a judgment.

In passing on the case the court recites the facts as brought to light by the testimony. It appears the plaintiff deserted his wife in 1896, charging cruel treatment. It was found by the court that the fundamental cause was the plaintiff's infatuation for another woman, though probably true that he suffered some well merited chastisement for his attentions to other women.

He applied for a divorce in Indiana in 1896, and lost the case. Then he left the state and came to Idaho, where he again sued for divorce in 1900, his wife coming out here to defend the case. He then visited his wife for the purpose, as asserted, of seeking reconciliation, but he took pains to have witnesses stationed where they could hear what passed. The court finds that, had he sincerely desired a reconciliation, he would have gone to her home, and not waited until she had followed him across the continent, to defend his application for a divorce. The wife received judgment in the second suit, but he was successful in the lower court in the present, his third action.

The case was taken to the supreme court by Attorney Eugene O'Neill of this city, who has been Mrs. Stoneburner's attorney throughout the progress of this suit, since 1900. Mrs. Stoneburner is now a resident of California, and is employed as matron in the Hoopa Valley Indian school.

HE THREATENS MUTUAL LIFE

Lord Harmsworth Wants Able Man to Head Company.

Chicago, Dec. 29.—According to the Daily News correspondent, Lord Harmsworth cabled from London to the Mutual Life Insurance company, saying:

"I am insured in your company for two hundred and sixty thousand and I don't desire to injure the concern. However, unless a sound insurance man of proved ability is appointed to the presidency, I will be forced to attack the company in the interest of British policy holders in all my periodicals."

In reply, Lord Harmsworth received a call from D. C. Haldeman, the London manager, who showed a cablegram instructing him to "keep Harmsworth quiet." Lord Harmsworth answered, saying that the conduct of the company was disgraceful as far as insurance features were concerned. He said he wouldn't consent to the selection of a man unfamiliar with insurance, and recommended Mr. Haldeman. He stated further that he would reserve his attack seven days. The attack on Peabody is about due.

Harmsworth controls thirty or more publications in England, and on the continent, and he calls to his aid the personal assistance of the big politicians and financiers of Europe and America.
