Pacific Cable Completed LINE TO HONOLULU NOW IN WORKING ORDER.

Honolulu, Jan. 2.—Having buoyed the deep sea end of the cable in the turbulent Molokai channel Friday morning, December 26th, after much difficulty and great risk, the cable ship "Silverton" docked at Honolulu to await favorable weather before attempting to splice the shore and sea ends of the cable. The sea was running mountain high and no attempt was made to pick up the cable until yesterday, when scarcely a breeze stirred the waters of the harbor. At daylight the "Silverton" arrived off Koho head where the shore end has been buoyed since Monday. With little difficulty the line from the bottom was spliced upon the deck and passed over the stern sheaves and a start was made for the cutter buoy. The cable was paid out at a rate of seven knots per hour. The cable was finally taken up at 3:44 o'clock without any untoward incidents. Connection with the testing room was quickly made and San Francisco responded promptly to the call. Congratulations and compliments of the season passed between the ship and San Francisco and the shore connection was then made at 4:40 p. m.

A New Canal.

A preliminary survey for a canal from Fall river running south to Teton river, crossing the same and running to Moody creek, has been run lately. The length of the canal will be about 15 miles, with a width for the first eight miles of 36 feet. A flume across the Teton river will be required for a distance of 1170 feet at a height of 80 feet above the river, and a further length of flume of about 630 feet at a height of from 2 to 14 feet, making a length of 1800 feet of flume.

The canal is estimated to cost \$50,000, of which the flume will cost \$15,000. The canal will cover about 6000 acres of land between Teton river and Moody creek, all of which is taken up.

A meeting was held and a company was formed with James Siddoway, Jacob Johnston, John Briggs, J. R. Allen and John Crawley as directors. Within a few hours after organizing, \$15,000 was subscribed. It is expected that work will commence right away in getting out timber for the trestle work required for the flume. A. S. B.

City Council Meets.

The city council convened in regular session last Monday evening, with Aldermen Ransopher and Bowers in their seats and Mayor Bartlett presiding. City Attorney C. Thompson was on hand to settle any question of a legal nature.

The resignations of Alderman Gibson and City Treasurer Hyatt were accepted and Ben E. Bowers, of Golden Rule fame, was elected to fill the vacancy caused by Mr. Gibson leaving. Tom Whitten, the popular drygoods man was elected city treasurer. All vacancies having been filled, the council proceeded to the passing of bills and the transaction of the ordinary routine of business. An ordinance prohibiting the distribution of handbills or any advertising matter upon the streets and sidewalks of certain portions of the city was then passed, and is as follows:

ORDINANCE No. 83.

An ordinance prohibiting the distribution and circulation of handbills, circulars and advertisements upon the sidewalks and streets within certain prescribed limits, and to provide penalties therefor.

Be it ordained by the Chairman and Board of Trustees of the Village of St. Anthony:

Section 1. That any person who shall distribute in any manner any handbill, circular or any advertisement whatever in and upon the following portions of streets in that part of the Village of St. Anthony lying and being situate north of the North Fork of Snake river, to-wit: That portion of Bridge street from Egin Canal to Idaho Avenue, that portion of Main street from Fifth street to Third street, that portion of Washington Avenue from Fifth street to Third street, and that portion of Idaho Avenue from Fifth street to Third street shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and on conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not exceeding \$100 and in default of payment of such fine and costs shall be committed to the Village jail until such fine is paid at the rate of \$2 per day.


