his absence by some member thereof, who shall act as chairman pro tempore and who shall have the same rights, privileges, powers and duties as the regularly elected chairman would have if he were present; the clerk shall then proceed to call the roll and note the absentees, whereupon the chairman shall announce whether or not a quorum is present.

Rule 7. If it shall appear that a quorum is present, the board shall proceed to business in the following manner:

- 1st. Roll call.
- 2nd. Reading of the minutes of last meeting.
- 3rd. Reading petitions, memorials, remonstrances or other communications.
- 4th. Report of officers.
- 5th. Report of standing committees.
- 6th. Reports of special committees.
- 7th. Unfinished business and allowance of bills.
- 8th. Introduction and first reading of bills for ordinances.
- 9th. Second reading, consideration and amendment of bills for ordinances.
- 10th. Third reading and final vote on bills for ordinances.
- 11th. Motions, resolutions and miscellaneous business.
- 12th. Reading, correcting and approving the minutes of the meeting.
- 13th. Adjournment.

**Ordinance No. 14.**

An ordinance repealing ordinance No. 1 and to provide the time, place and manner of holding regular meetings, and the rules governing all special and regular meetings, and to establish the order of business at such meetings, and to provide for the appointment of standing committees.

Be it ordained by the chairman and board of trustees of the village of Teton City:

Section 1. That ordinance No. 1, and entitled "An ordinance to fix the time and place of meeting of the board of trustees of the village of Teton City," be and is hereby repealed.

Section 2. That the regular meetings of the board of trustees of the village of Teton City shall be held in Fred Schwendiman's place of business, upon the first Tuesday in each month at 7 p. m., until such time as the city shall be provided with a suitable building that is specially provided for such meetings.

Section 3. All special meetings shall be called by the chairman of the board of trustees, or in case of his absence or refusal to do so, on the request of any member of said board; then by any two members of the said board of trustees. Said call shall be in writing and shall be signed by the chairman, or the calling members and shall be personally served by the village marshal, and shall state fully and specifically the time, place and the business to be transacted, and no other business except that mentioned in the call shall be transacted at a special meeting.

Section 4. A copy of the call for each special meeting must be transcribed in the journal of its proceedings, so as to become a part of the minutes of such special meeting.

Section 5. The rules of procedure, and order of business as prescribed in the succeeding, shall be adhered to by the board of trustees, unless they shall be temporarily suspended by a three-fourths vote; and on such vote the year and days shall be recorded.

Section 6. Any member desiring to create an ordinance shall prepare the same in writing, and present to the board for action.

Section 7. On the passage or adoption of every law or ordinance, and every resolution or order to enter into a contract by the board of trustees, the year and days shall be called and recorded; and to pass or adopt any by-law, ordinance or any such resolution or order, a concurrence of the majority of the whole number of members elected to the board of trustees of offices by the board of trustees shall be made viva voce, and a concurrence of a like majority shall be required, and the names of those, and for whom they voted, on the vote resulting in an appointment shall be recorded.

Section 8. All ordinances and resolutions or orders for the appropriation or payment of money, shall require the concurrence of a majority of all members elected to the board of trustees; ordinances of a general or permanent nature shall be fully and distinctly read on three different days unless three-fourths of the board shall temporarily suspend the rule. Ordinances shall contain no subject which shall not be clearly expressed in its title, and no ordinance or section thereof shall be revised or amended unless the ordinance, or section, so amended shall be repealed.

Section 9. At all meetings of the board a majority of the trustees shall constitute a quorum to do business; a smaller number may adjourn from day to day, and may compel the attendance of absent members as by ordinance provided.

Section 10. The village clerk shall attend on all regular and special meetings of the board of trustees and keep a true record of the proceedings thereof, and enter in full all ordinances and resolutions, orders, etc., in the journal of proceedings of said meetings. In his absence the chairman of the board shall appoint from among the members of the board of trustees then present, a clerk pro tempore who shall have the same rights, privileges, powers and duties as the clerk would have if present.

Section 11. At the hour herein provided for the meetings, the board shall be called to order by the chairman, or in
