**45,000 ACRES OF ORCHARD.**

**Report of State Horticultural Board Suggest Legislation.**

The state board of horticulture inspection has submitted its biennial report to Governor Morrison. Dr. H. P. Ustick, the president of the board, in transmitting the report to the governor, among other things said:

"There is at this time in this state a total of something over 45,000 acres of orchard.

To inspect this vast amount of orchard ground, scattered over so large a territory, has been an impossible task for the ten men, although they have been faithful and active in their duties in the limited time allotted to each one. The horticultural interests of this state are becoming so great that with the prospect near at hand of one-third more being planted in the coming spring, it will be readily seen that the funds for the carrying on of this work are entirely too small, and that the industry itself will, in the near future, be second to none in our state, and, in fact, will probably lead in the matter of revenue.

"We have been hampered in another way. The law provides that the property of non-residents shall be put in perfect order, without providing the means for so doing. We would suggest that in the appropriation for the next two years there be at least \$2,000 set aside that can be used for cleaning up, spraying or destroying orchards that are in bad condition, belonging to these non-residents. The expense so incurred, according to law, becomes a lien upon the property and when collected is returnable to the state. Thus you will see that the \$2,000 asked for this purpose would be in the nature of ready money and as a loan rather than as a positive appropriation.

"With the increase of acreage and the inability of the inspectors with the present appropriation to properly cover the ground, it is needful that the coming legislature look into this matter thoroughly and make such appropriation as will be adequate to the needs of the industry."

"The outlook for orchard planting in the next two years is very promising; at the present time thousands of acres are being contemplated.

"Probably the most active operations will be along the Snake river where large irrigation projects are being established."

**Fremont Has It Beaten.**

A good potato story comes from the Green ranch, where six potatoes were dug from one hill, not one of which weighed less than a pound and the largest weighing three and one-half pounds. Can any farmer beat it.—Nampa Herald.

Several Rigby farmers have this beaten. One man brought in a 10 pound potato, and there were several other large potatoes in the hill. Another Rigby farmer produced a 9 1/4 pound tuber. M. T. Peck broke up a small patch of ground. Just ordinary Fremont county sagebrush land, which he bought a year ago, planted 40 fruit trees with rows of potatoes between the trees, paid a man \$1 a day for attending to the crop and dig it, and raised enough potatoes to pay for the trees and their planting and for the ground on which they grew, seed, cultivation and gathering and every expense connected therewith, and his potatoes will average nearly two pounds each, and a large per cent will weigh three pounds or better.

**A Complicated Case.**
