THE MAYFLOWER MINE.

It is Finally Transferred to the New Company—The Price Paid—Brief History of the Mine.

Last Tuesday, John V. Farwell, one of the leading mining men of Chicago, formally accepted the Mayflower mine, of Bullion, and on behalf of himself and associates in the new Mayflower company, immediately left for Blackfoot and the east. The price paid for the mine is as agreed to early last January, to-wit: \$375,000.

The Mayflower mine was purchased from the locators, a year and a half ago, by Michael Shaughnessy, of Salt Lake City, who was then United States Marshal for Utah, and Colonel E. A. Wall. The principal was \$25,000 in cash. At that time the mine was a mere prospect, but a very promising one, and the price was looked upon as very high. But Colonel Wall evidently knew what he was buying, as within ten days after he began work with a small crew. Last spring the mine was ready for the extraction of ore. As soon as teams could get to Bullion the shipment of ore began, and by the close of the season the aggregate value of the ore shipped exceeded \$200,000. Shortly thereafter it was stated that negotiations were on foot to transfer the ownership of the mine to eastern parties. But the rumor was handled tenderly, as it were, and only whispered in one's ears in the strictest confidence. Presently the report came from Salt Lake that the negotiations were coming to an end, that they were concluded, that the mine was sold, and that Colonel Wall would come in to turn it over to the new company. A couple of weeks thereafter—on the 10th of January of this year—Colonel Wall came in accompanied by George L. Havens, an experienced and successful mining superintendent from Leadville, Colorado, to whom he turned the mine over.

The conditions of the sale then became public: The new company had paid \$35,000 to bind the bargain, and were to pay \$125,000 more at stated periods prior to the 1st of June, 1882, when they were to accept or refuse the mine.

But no ore was to be shipped until the mine was accepted and mostly paid for. This agreement has since been fulfilled, and, as above stated, the mine was accepted last Tuesday, Mr. Farwell having come out from Chicago for the special purpose of formally accepting it.

The mine being fully turned over to the new company, the shipping of ore has commenced. Last Wednesday 40 tons were shipped, and all teamsters that have wished for a back load have since been gratified. From this time on to the close of the season, at least, the Mayflower mine will doubtless ship a great deal of ore and give employment to a large number of men.

THE BLACKFOOT STAGES.

They Will Run on Summer Time Until Further Orders.

During the past two or three days the running time of the Blackfoot stages has been changed from the winter to the summer schedule, and yesterday the change was completed to this end of the line by the arrival of two stages. As two stages also left here yesterday the change is probably completed to Blackfoot by this time. From now until fall the Blackfoot stage will be due here at 2 o'clock in the afternoon, and leave at 8 in the morning.

The dispatches published in this issue of the TIMES were received at 1:20 o'clock last night. A second batch of dispatches is expected before the TIMES goes to press. If these come too late for this issue, they will be condensed for to-morrow's paper. In the future our dispatches will only be 24 hours old when they get here instead of 48, as formerly, and the TIMES will supply them from 12 to 60 hours ahead of all others brought here by mail.

THE MINES OF BULLION.

Their Probable Aggregate Yield This Season 12,000 Tons—The Ore to be Hauled to Hailey for Trans-shipment.

A gentleman who spent several days in Bullion, examining the mines there, and endeavoring to form some idea of their productiveness, says that he is of the opinion that the yield of that camp this year will not fall short of \$2,000,000. The Bullion, being the oldest and best-developed mine, will probably ship nearly 2,000 tons; the Mayflower will probably ship as much; the Jay Gould at least 1,000 tons; the O K 1,000 tons; the Idahoan 1,500 tons; and the Eureka 1,500 to 2,000 tons; while other claims will probably ship an aggregate of 2,000 tons. This large quantity of ore cannot be carried to the railway by the teams, numerous as they are. But the railroad is expected to be completed to Little Wood river some time in August, and from that on to the close of the season the shipping of ore from Bullion will be brisk and uninterrupted.

This ore will all be shipped to Hailey on light wagons, and loaded for the railroad from this point. This can be done much more advantageously and cheaply than from Bullion. Ore can be hauled down here by light teams for \$2 per ton, while heavy teams will not go to Bullion for ore for less than \$5 per ton to this point. The cost of handling being merely nominal, as aving of at least \$2 per ton can be made by shipping here. And this is what will be done. Cliff & McKay and another firm are figuring on the contracts for forwarding the ore, and by the first of next week the contracts will probably be closed and all the Bullion ores be brought here for re-shipment.
