## THE LAST CHANCE.

Those Bellevueites who have been after the county seat are hard to down. After Hailey had carried every point, repulsed their every assault, they step forward and, standing in the last ditch, as it were, advance an allegation of ballot-box stuffing. They are not to be blamed for doing this; but it would be better for themselves and for Wood River if they had finally accepted the inevitable, and, for the good of this section, permitted the records to be brought here.

Whether this allegation of theirs will re-open the whole case, or not, cannot be determined until a certified copy of the decision is received. If it does reopen the case, the end must result in Hailey's favor, because the frauds on Bellevue's side at Broadford, at Indian Creek, and elsewhere, are notorious, and ought to be easily proven. If it does not, and the question be confined to the stuffing of the ballot-box in Hailey, the result must likewise be favorable to Hailey, as, immediately after the vote, last fall, the Grand Jury thoroughly investigated that charge, and dismissed it upon the sworn testimony of residents of Bellevue. R. P. Dayton, a lumber dealer of Bellevue, who is known to be as "square" and "white" a man as ever trod in shoe-leather, and who was one of Bellevue's challengers at the Hailey polls, said to the Grand Jury: "I know that the ballot-box was not stuffed while I was there, because I was so close to it, all the time, that I could put my hand on it."

It is a grave charge, however, that is reiterated before Judge Prickett, and, while, for Hailey's sake, we want to see it disproved, we hope that those who have made it will be able to offer better evidence in its substantiation than a mere idle rumor.

## THE BLACKFOOT STAGE LATE.

The Blackfoot stage, which is due here at 2 p. m., seldom gets here before 3 and never before 4 o'clock. The time of arrival, we will regulate the issue of this paper. Until then the TIMES is liable to be issued at any hour of the afternoon or evening.

## DECORATION DAY.

How It Will be Observed by the ex-Soldiers on Wood River—The Hailey Comrades to Meet at the Sound of the Fire Bell.

A number of ex-soldiers met in the school-house, last Saturday evening, to agree upon a programme to be observed by them to-morrow (Memorial Day).

Comrade Woodworth stated that Comrade Bury had sent an order for flowers to Boise. They would undoubtedly come. [They arrived yesterday.—Rep.]

It was resolved that all ex-soldiers of both armies, now on Wood River, be invited to meet at the office of W. T. Riley, at half-past 11 o'clock Tuesday morning, that they there "fall in" under the command of Comrade Woodworth, and proceed to the Hailey graveyard, to decorate the grave of Comrade James H. Allen, of the First Regiment, United States Mechanical Fusiliers, who was frozen to death last winter, on his way to Bullion.

A special invitation was extended to the ex-soldiers of Bellevue to join with us in decorating Comrade Allen's grave, and Comrades George M. Parsons, Texas Angel and W. T. Riley were appointed a committee to agree with the Bellevue Comrades upon a plan of exercises.

Adjourned. [Early Sunday morning the Bellevue comrades sent their regards, and advised their Hailey comrades that they had secured a band of music and would come to join them about noon, Tuesday. The procession will then form, march to the Hailey graveyard, decorate Comrade Allen's grave, then proceed to Bellevue to decorate the grave of a comrade buried there.

The Hailey comrades will assemble

ble at the sound of the fire-bell, some time during the forenoon, or about noon, to-morrow.—REP.]

## THE COUNTY SEAT MATTER.

A Final Decision Delayed for Another Month.

A letter to the TIMES, dated Boise, May 26, says:

The decision in the county seat matter was rendered this morning at chambers, to the effect that all matters set up in the answer to the writ of mandate to the County Commissioners be overruled, except the allegation of fraud in stuffing the ballot-box in Hailey precinct, at the election held September last—which matter is to be heard June 24, 1882, at Hailey, before Judge Prickett.

The decision undoubtedly debars the County Commissioners from appealing from the prior decision of the District Court, and should have the effect of causing the removal of the records here at once, even if, in case the alleged fraud be proved, the records should afterward be transferred to Bellevue. But whether or no it will have that effect, no one here seems to know. Whatever the effect of this last decision may be, however, there is no doubt but that this is the last effort, the expiring gasp, of the unreasonable crowd that has been fighting Hailey, in this matter, since the election.

## LOUIS ENGLER.

He is Enjoying Himself in Germany, But Does Not Like the People.

Jake Engler has just received a letter from his brother Louis, now absent in Germany, from which we are permitted to make the following extract. The letter is dated Thorn, April 29th, and the writer says: "I returned yesterday from a trip of five weeks' duration to Stettin and Berlin. I had intended to be gone about three weeks, but I enjoyed myself so well that I could not refrain from making use of the time. I spent three weeks in Berlin and saw a great deal worth seeing, of which I will tell you after my return. Berlin has improved and grown very much since the French war, and has a great many institutions worth seeing, and I thought it would not be amiss to see them while in Germany, and I finally arrived at the conclusion that I had not seen anything of this world heretofore. But when it comes down to the country and the people and their modes of living, I can only say, God bless America and her people, which I hardly believed to be the case ere I made this trip, but have satisfied myself that such is the case. Of course, you find some good people in this country also, but I speak of the average."—Tuscanora Times-Review.
