THE COUNTY SEAT CASE.

The Evidence all In, and the Arguments to be Made To-morrow.

There was some excitement on the street and in court, to-day, during the progress of the hearing in the county-seat matter, and for a while it looked as if the Bellevueites had "a sure thing" to put in evidence, they seemed so jubilant. George W. Cranston, one of the judges of election at the Hailey polls, was brought up from Bellevue by Deputy Sheriff Hi. Hunter, who had him under arrest on a charge of misdemeanor preferred by some citizen of Bellevue; but he was soon released on a writ of habeas corpus sued out before Judge Prickett. He was then put on the stand, and his testimony is said not to have been as satisfactory to the Bellevue people as they had hoped for.

The examination of witnesses was concluded about half past 3 o'clock this afternoon, when the court adjourned until 9 o'clock to-morrow morning, at the request of Judge Brumbach, of the Bellevue side, who claimed that he needed time for preparation.

MORTON C. FISHER.

His Opinion of the Bullion Mines, and of the Future of Hailey.

Morton C. Fisher, the prominent mining man who arrived here yesterday, visited the Idahoan and Bullion canyon mines yesterday. He was very favorably impressed by their appearance, and believes that they will yield large quantities of ore. The Idahoan mine, Mr. Fisher says, should have a good hoisting rig; the shaft should be sunk vertically, levels opened at stated depths, and the vein crosscut every 50 or 100 feet. The mine is well timbered.

Hailey, Mr. Fisher thinks, has a brilliant future. Just now, the place is rather quiet, but the announcement that the railway terminus has been fixed here will act as a stimulant, and the place will soon receive important accessions of business and population. For a while the town will depend upon the railroad to a certain extent; but in a year or two the benefits resulting from the development of our mines and other natural resources will be felt, and from that time on our progress will be rapid. In five or six years Hailey will have a population of 18,000 to 20,000 souls. The section at large is a most promising one, and a great many mines will doubtless be discovered in it.

The length of the cold or winter season, while it will somewhat retard the opening of the country, will not interfere with the working of all good properties, as soon as work can be prosecuted under cover.

Mr. Fisher will remain longer than he intended to when he came. He started out on a fishing excursion to Silver creek this morning, and as he is an enthusiastic fisherman there is no knowing when he will come back.

JAMES A. GARFIELD POST, NO. 4.

A Post of the Grand Army of the Republic Organized in Bellevue.

A charter has just been issued to Jay G. Kelley, who served in the First Nevada Infantry; W. E. Davis, 5th Pa. Cav.; James B. Black, 92d Ill. Inf.; Wm. G. Seamands, 1st Nev. Inf.; Henry Heuser, 1st Nev. Inf.; S. M. Thompson, 19th O. V. V. Inf.; T. Mitchell, 104th N. Y. Inf.; I. D. Bureh, 6th Mo.; L. D. Woodruff, 35th N. Y. Inf.; Isaac Seyoc, 3d Pa. H. A.; H. C. Wells, 44th Mo. Inf.; Wm. Fleckner, 18th U. S. Inf.; Dav. Wiseman, 8th Ky. Inf.; Anthony Ethier, 2d Col. Cav.; Samuel Friend, 28th Ia. Inf.; G. D. Bradley, 2d Ia. Cav.; Jno. C. Weber, 26th Ia. Inf.; Thos. B. Read, 18th N. Y. Cav.; and Henry C. Babb, 8th Ia. Cav.; constituting them and their associates and successors a Post of the Grand Army of the Republic, to be known as James A. Garfield Post No. 4, of the Provisional Department of Utah. The charter is dated Salt Lake City, June 1, 1882, and is signed by Department Commander George C. Douglas and by Assistant Adjutant General F. M. Bishop. It was received a day or two ago.

TWO OLD TIMERS.

Who Will Grow Up With This Section, if they Stay.

Captain Jay G. Kelley and Daniel E. Waldron, came up from Bellevue to-day, and dropped into the TIMES office, to talk over old times. The former gentleman is now located at Bellevue, where he owns a two-story house and lot and does all the assaying for most of the companies operating there. He came to Wood river from Leadville. Captain Kelley was formerly local editor of the Virginia (Nev.) Chronicle, the same paper upon which the publisher of the TIMES was afterward mining reporter.

Mr. Waldron, the gentleman who accompanied Captain Kelley, was a prominent attorney in Nevada and San Francisco for many years, and has but just arrived on Wood river, to look about with the intention of settling here, if he likes the outlook.

Both the gentlemen named are good and useful citizens, wherever they live, and the TIMES hopes that they will remain here and "grow up with the country."

E. A. WHITE'S BUILDING.

It Will be 30x40 With a 30-foot Addition, and Have Two Stories.

The new building which E. A. White is erecting on his Main street lot, in this city, will have a frontage of 30 feet, be 40 feet deep, and two stories high. The lower floor will be divided into two stores, respectively 12 and 18 feet in width; the larger one is to be used by Mr. White as a salesroom; the other one to be rented. The log house which Mr. White has used for a store has been set back from the street, and will be used as a workshop and store-room.

The second story will have six rooms, 12x13 feet, three of which will be on each side of the five-foot hall that will be left in the center.

THE MAMMOTH MINE.

It is Showing Up as Large as the Minnie Moore.

A gentleman who recently visited the Mammoth mine, near Bellevue, assures the TIMES that the ore-vein in that mine is showing up fully as wide as the Minnie Moore vein. The ore is not quite as rich as yet, but the depth attained is not as great as in the Minnie Moore. And it is situated near at Bellevue, it being so close to the stream that a man can sit on the ledge, on solid galena, and fish in Wood River. The Mammoth is being opened systematically, and a great deal of ore is ready for sacking. The first shipment will be made to Salt Lake in a few days, and shipments will be made regularly, thereafter.

THE COLORADO FRACTION.

Ore Will be Shipped from it in a Few Days.

Six men—all that can be worked to any advantage—are employed on the Colorado Fraction, the new find in Idahoan gulch. They are stripping the ledge, and blasting the hanging wall away from the ore-body. Two carpenters are also at work making a sheltered platform to break and sack the ore upon. Several bales of ore sacks were received at the mine a day or two ago, and the owners will begin shipping in a few days.

Arrested for Grand Larceny.

About half-past 1 o'clock this afternoon a man was arrested on Main street, in this city, and taken to Bellevue on a warrant charging him with the theft of a saddle and bridle of the value of more than \$50. The charge against him is grand larceny.
