A NATURAL CONSEQUENCE.

The seat of Alturas county and the Wood River terminus of the Oregon Short Line Railway having been permanently fixed at Hailey, all other Wood River towns will soon settle down to a hard-pan basis, and their inhabitants, will, in self-defense, be compelled to devote their time and energy to the development of mines in their respective vicinities. Bellevue will probably lose a portion of her floating population, besides about 19-20ths of her boasted "immigrant trade." Ketchum will do well if she holds her own,—so will Galena; while Sawtooth will not be likely to grow much larger than it is now. Vienna will be a town as long as her mines last. This, while it may be disappointing to the owners of real estate in those towns, will redound to the public benefit. In future the merchants of Hailey can lay in larger and more varied stocks than they have had heretofore without fear of having the goods remain on their hands; and the people of this section, who have frequently been compelled to send several hundred miles away for goods, will now be able to get all they want in Hailey.

SPECIMENS FOR THE EXPOSITION.

Mine-owners who intend to send specimens to the Denver Exposition, are reminded that the time allowed them to forward them is very brief. Unless the specimens reach the express office in this city by the 15th of July, at the very latest, they cannot be given a good place—if any at all—at the Exposition. It is of the greatest importance that Wood River be well represented there. Mining men should therefore hasten their contributions.

A gentleman who has been mining for years in various parts of the West says that Hailey, being located in the very heart of a vast and rapidly-developing mining section, is much more favorably situated than most of the Territorial cities. Even Denver, he says, is situated miles and miles away from any mine, while Hailey has several at her very doors.

The business men of Hailey had better see to it that they carry as complete stocks in their line as can be found anywhere. There will soon be important additions to our population; and if the stores do not have what this new population will need, other stores will soon be opened. The public must be accommodated.

The demand for copies of the TIMES containing Judge Prickett's final decision in the county seat case not having been fully supplied, we reprint it in full, to-day, on the first page.

From this time on, business will be more segregated here than it has been. Heavier stocks will be carried by individual houses, but they will be in special lines.

THE DEER CREEK BRIDGE.

It will be completed by the 4th of July.

C. E. Bolton, who resides on Deer Creek, came in the TIMES office yesterday, and said that he had called on a few of our business men, during the forenoon, for contributions to finish the Deer Creek bridge. He had met with good success. He already had \$215 subscribed, and wanted to increase the amount to \$250, when the I. & O. L. Co. would be called on for the other \$100 that was required to complete the bridge and approaches. The bridge will be 150 feet long, of five spans, resting on two stone cribs and three other piers. The Robertsons have sawed, cut, and donated nearly all the lumber, several prospectors and teamsters have promised to contribute some days' work, and the amount above stated will suffice to complete the bridge by the 4th of July. On the day following the subscribers will be called upon for the amount of their subscriptions.

Mail for the Smokies.

This morning the first regular mail leaves over the new mail route up the gulch to the Smokies left this city on horseback. The new route is to be served tri-weekly.
