### THE WOLFSTONE MINE.

It Has Been Sold to a Strong Philadelphia Company.

J. F. Bailey, one of the leading iron merchants of Philadelphia, while at Hailey, recently, purchased the Wolfstone lode. This mine has been sold to the Lemhi Mining and Smelting Company—a Philadelphia incorporation—and A. D. Foote, of Leadville, will act as Superintendent. He will arrive in a few days, and place 20 men at work at once. There are about 800 tons of ore on the dump already, and large reserves in sight; and it is expected that a smelter will be erected in the fall.

**Mexican Officials Pillaging Arizona.**  
Tucson, July 7.—The Star's special says that a few days since a band of Mexican revenue officers crossed the line 15 miles into the Territory in pursuit of contraband goods. They raided a ranch near Ariva, killing the ranchman and pillaging his property. They returned to Sonora after committing a number of depredations. It is believed that while the raid was conducted by officers the real object of invasion was pillage.

### A PRODUCTIVE INDUSTRY.

Planted as an Experiment, a Hailey Garden Yields Rich Returns—A Hint to Lot-Owners.

Notwithstanding the general opinion which has hitherto prevailed regarding the comparative fertility of the soil upon which this town stands, still it has been generally believed that, owing to our cold nights and cool summers, very few plants could grow to maturity in this vicinity; and as this place has but recently been settled scarcely any opportunity has offered to dispel that conviction.

Early this spring, however, Mr. Banfield determined to give our soil a thorough test, and for that purpose broke the 1 1/2-acre lot at the upper end of First avenue, on which his dwelling stands, and prepared it for a garden. The result has proved so satisfactory, that what was started as a mere experiment has grown into a productive industry, and Mr. Banfield has about made up his mind that he can make more money out of his property as a vegetable garden than he could by selling it for building lots.

A TIMES reporter visited the garden the other day, and found it in as thriving a condition as it could be anywhere. There were hemptalks a foot high, locusts for shade trees, apple trees ten inches high, currant bushes grown from cuttings, strawberries that will be good next year, blackberries, gooseberries, splendid mint, Chili choy, China spinach, Kentucky bluegrass, two species of tomatoes, pepper, mustard, American spinach rose cabbage, parsnips, three kinds of lettuce, squashes, cabbages, beets, rutabagas, radishes, greens, celery, potatoes, peas, oats, rye, clover, onions, beans—in brief, almost everything that can be grown in a vegetable garden anywhere. Even corn was there—but only for ornament, as none will ripen in our climate. But with this single exception, everything was as thrifty as could be desired. Even the potatoes, which were somewhat damaged by frost, were growing finely.

A garden would, of course, not be complete without flowers. Of these there are roses, hollyhocks, 4 o'clocks, marigolds, poppies, morning glories, lilacs, pinks, even sunflowers. The pinks blossomed within seven weeks after planting—something that probably never occurred before.

All of the above (with the exception of the currants) were grown from the seed and will therefore be acclimatized. Next year the seed gathered from these plants can be planted almost anywhere in this region, with a fair probability of success.

The garden so far has more than paid for itself. Excepting an odd day now and then, when two Chinamen have been employed, one Chinaman has attended to it, under Mrs. Banfield's instructions, and the vegetables sold have realized more than enough to pay his wages and all other expenses connected with the garden. Next year this little 1 1/2 acre plot is expected to do much better still, and to yield a net profit of \$1,500 to \$2,000.

Hailey is entering upon an era of prosperity scarcely paralleled anywhere. By this time next year she will have a population of at least 5,000 souls. This large number of persons will consume a vast quantity of vegetables, fruits, flowers, and other garden produce. The money paid out for such produce will aggregate \$25,000 or \$30,000. All this can be kept right here, in town, if a few persons will only go to the trouble of raising the produce. If the produce is not raised here the amount above stated will have to be paid out to ranchers from Cassia or Boise county.

**Patents Issued.**
