## A SINGULAR STORY.

### ALLEGED PREMEDITATED AND CRIMINAL NEGLIGENCE.

In Order to Cause Dissatisfaction With His Superior, a Chief Clerk Permits the Work of His Division to Accumulate in His Office.

WASHINGTON, July 23.—A rather singular story of premeditated and criminal negligence in acting upon invalid pension cases in the Third Auditor's office is afloat, and is assigned as the reason for the recent suspension of H. H. Whitney, Chief of the Invalid Pension Division of that office. The division of which Mr. Whitney was chief employed about 40 clerks whose duty it was to examine invalid pension claims, reimbursement claims, and the claims of widows and minors. For sometime, it is averred, that there has been much complaint of unexplained delays of these claims, causing general embarrassment and entailing suffering upon widows and orphans, and other claimants for pensions, which became so numerous that the Auditor instituted an investigation.

According to the report in circulation it was found that immense numbers of claims had been held back for no imaginable reason, some of them being claims long since audited. Large numbers of letters, sealed and directed, ready for mailing, were found lying in Whitney's office, having been untouched for days and weeks, and important documents and notifications were found to have accumulated to an extent never before known in the history of the division.

Whitney was immediately suspended, and has not yet made an explanation.

The secret of the delay, which is now said to have been intentional, is alleged to be the determination of Whitney to cause dissatisfaction with the work of the Commissioner of Pensions. The reason assigned for such a course is that Whitney was displeased at a decision of the Third Auditor and Second Comptroller, made some months ago, that the work of his division should be subject to the interposition of the Commissioner of Pensions. Prior to the date of that ruling there had been no complaint of the work of Whitney's division, and it is asserted that when that decision was made and he found himself practically reduced from the position of head of division to that of a subordinate, he said that his only way to get even was to hold back claims and excite dissatisfaction with the new order, in the hope of having it reversed.

### A Filthy-Minded Thief.

WASHINGTON, July 22.—Williamson, the discharged clerk in the Department of Justice, and accused in the Police Court of purloining autograph letters of Daniel Webster and others from the Department, is a brother of Judge Williamson, of this city. The officers say that Williamson's downfall came from his passion for collecting improper books. His mind became debauched from the constant perusal of rare works of this character. He took to drink, and rapidly sank from one position to another, until finally he has been discharged. It is said that a lobbyist furnished the capital for his collection. Two months ago, it is said, Williamson sold his entire collection for \$2,000 to a wealthy citizen of New York, who has a taste for forbidden literature.

### The French Government and the Municipality of Paris Disagree.

PARIS, July 23.—President Grevy has annulled the resolution of the Paris municipality in favor of the maintenance of Flaqueat as Prefect of the Department of the Seine, on the ground that the resolution amounts to a claim of autonomy. Flaqueat now persists in demanding the acceptance of his resignation.

In the Chamber of Deputies, today, Goblet said that he personally favored the extension of municipal liberties for Paris, but he rejected the idea of commercial autonomy. He declared that he would cause the law to be respected.

## ARIZONA.

### Indian Depredations—Several Settlers Killed—Import of Mining Sulf.

TUCSON, July 22.—Later reports from Tonto Basin confirm the news of the last Indian fight and depredations. In the fight at Sysby's four Indians were killed, and at Tewksberry, six. Mr. Church was killed; Medley and his men, who went in search of cattle, are missing and supposed to be killed, as Indians were seen near. Hazelton and his sister are safe. Reports say that 60 to 80 Indians are camped on Coon Creek, and evidently bound down Salt River. Buildings have been burned, stock killed and driven off, and the crops laid waste, causing great loss to settlers. The people are taking measures to protect themselves.

GLOBE, A. T., July 20.—Sysby came in from Wildeye county badly wounded and reports his brother and four others killed in Pleasant Valley. The Tewksberry's started from their ranch to notify Sysby, but never reached there. It is supposed that the three Tewksberry brothers, Frever and Waham were killed, as they have not been heard from.

Two hundred or three hundred Indians are reported on the war-path in the vicinity of Pleasant Valley and Wildeye county.

Globe is trying to equip a company to take the field.

Dan Ming is trying to get a company of Tonto scouts to take the field, but it is thought that the agent will refuse to let him have them.

Suit has been instituted against the Grand Central Mining Company, of Tombstone, for a three-tenths interest, by the heirs of Oliver Boger and for a like interest in the proceeds of the mine, amounting to over \$500,000.
