WILL APPEAR MONDAY.

A tabular statement showing the names of the mines, their location, the character of the rock in which they occur, the quantity of silver, gold, lead, copper, and iron which their ores carry, together with their value per ton in dollars and cents, and the weight of the specimens sent to the Denver Exposition from Wood River, will be published in Monday evening's TIMES. The finely engraved map of the great Wood River region, which was drawn expressly for the TIMES by Hon. E. B. True, Deputy United States Mineral Surveyor, will also appear in the same paper.

The tabular statement was prepared by Mr. Bradley, the assayer, and carefully revised, to secure its correctness. It will therefore be a most valuable index to the value of the ores of the mines of this region, and many mining men will doubtless desire a few copies to send to their friends. Nearly 300 copies have already been ordered, but more will doubtless be wanted, and they should be ordered this evening or to-morrow.

THE NARROW GAUGES.

They Are Sold to a Chicago Merchant
Prince for \$80,000.

The two mines known as the Narrow Gauges, which are situated about seven miles up Deer creek, and on the line of the great Bullion lode, have recently been sold for \$80,000, and the money was paid two or three days ago. The purchaser is Mr. Farwell, of Chicago, the gentleman who is already known here as one of the purchasers of the Mayflower mine, of Bullion, for \$375,000.

The Narrow Gauges were among the first claims located on Deer creek, about two years ago. They paid from discovery, and, although not systematically worked, yielded handsomely last summer. In the fall, Messrs. McGregor & Connors bonded them for \$18,000, paying \$3,000 down as a bonus, in case there was no sale. This spring they paid for them. And now, less than two months later, they realize a profit of \$62,000 on their \$18,000 investment. This is almost as profitable as dealing in Comstock shares on a rising market.

HOME-GROWN OATS.

Master Tucker Proving that Cereals Can
be Raised on Indian Creek.

Samuel T. Tucker, a lad about 12 years old, was honorably mentioned in the TIMES, last fall, because during the preceding summer, by herding horses, running errands, hunting grouse, sage hens and fishing, and selling his catch, he had realized a sum sufficient to pay for his board and tuition for two years at La Grande, but got homesick, and soon came to Albion, in Cassia county, where his parents were wintering.

This spring the family returned to their ranch on Indian Creek, back of the smelter, and the last week in May Master Tucker planted a small patch of virgin soil to oats, as an experiment. The experiment met with the same success that has attended all similar ventures here. The oats are growing finely, and are now three feet six inches high, with very full heads and a thrifty look.

The coming fall Master Tucker will plow a piece of ground and plant it to oats; while the boy's father, satisfied that he can raise a crop, will plant all of Indian gulch, from the smelter to the springs, to alfalfa.
