

There is some talk that this or that candidate for office is a recent comer here, and that he should therefore not seek office. This is pure nonsense, as nineteen-twentieths of the people of Wood River and Sawtooth have come here within the past year. A candidate who will rely upon his claims as a pioneer to boost him into office will therefore have but a slim following. It would be fun indeed to have the issue made; and the Johnny-come-latelys would get away with the baggage too slick.

FOR COUNTY TREASURER.
Probate Judge Dilley announces that he is not a candidate for re-election to his present office, but if the voters of Alturas county want him for Treasurer he will gladly serve. Judge Dilley is well known, is thoroughly competent, and, if nominated, will poll a big vote in Bellevue, Broadford, and other precincts.

LET THE PARTY RULE.
It is stated by parties who have made it their business to find out, that the feeling among the Bellevue delegates to the Democratic County Convention on the question of the admission of the delegates from the upper country, is divided, some delegates being in favor of the admission, while others oppose it.

We are at a loss to know upon what just grounds admission could be denied any delegates duly elected by a mass meeting of Democrats anywhere in the county. The County Central Committee, whose business it was to make a just apportionment, so apportioned the delegates that about one-third of the Democratic voters in the county (and those living in the old precincts, at that) should elect two-thirds of the entire number of delegates to the Convention. This was as flagrant an injustice as was ever perpetrated by any body of men supposed to have the interests of their constituents at heart.

The action of the committee being manifestly wrong, the body of voters chose not to be guided by it, and mass meetings and caucuses were at once held in every precinct unjustly apportioned, to consider the matter. The result was the election of the delegates who will meet in convention in a day or two.

Now, it is very evident that the bone and sinew, the great mass of the Democratic party refused to ratify the action of the committee. This being the case, that committee, had it had a proper sense of its dignity, would have resigned at once, and called for a mass meeting to undo the harm which had been done. But the gentlemen composing that committee took a different view of the matter, and, while audaciously holding on to their offices, seek to organize in opposition to the will of the great mass of their party, so unmistakably expressed! That is to say, they, the few, endeavor to override the will of the thousands of their partisans!

It cannot, of course, be expected that the delegates elected in Hailey and the upper country will submit to be denied seats in the Convention. Such a course would prove them unworthy the confidence reposed in them by their constituents. They are the real representatives of the Democratic party, and are therefore in honor bound to do that for which they were elected. If they do not do this they will betray the trust reposed in them, and merit the just execration of their fellow citizens.

THE LAW SHOULD TAKE ITS COURSE.
We regret to learn that petitions requesting Governor Nell to either annul or commute the sentence of Ridgeway, the man now under sentence of death for the murder of John ("Curly") Sherwood, are being circulated. Ridgeway was duly convicted, after a fair trial during which he was ably defended, of the most horrible crime known to human and divine law. The proof of his guilt was clear and conclusive, and no extenuating circumstances were offered in evidence. As, owing to the many murders recently committed, the people of Wood River had been wishing for an example that would have a restraining effect, Ridgeway's conviction was received with general satisfaction, and his deserved punishment was looked forward to with confidence. Since the trial no new evidence has come to light, no new facts tending to show the innocence of the condemned man have been ascertained, yet the people are being urged to pray for the intervention of our chief magistrate.

The people of Wood River, justly alarmed at the prevalence of crime in our midst, have for weeks past threatened to take the law in their own hands. Only last week the general dissatisfaction was so plain and the feeling so alarming that the guards in the jail were doubled, while at the same time the TIMES was urgently requested to suppress all mention of the matter, lest an outbreak be precipitated. We therefore feel that we echo the general impression when we state that if Governor Neil interferes in this matter such a feeling of indignation will be aroused in this community that no one can foretell the consequences.

There are seven men now in Alturas county awaiting trial for murder or manslaughter, besides the condemned man; and while some of them may not be guilty, and all deserve a fair trial, it is very doubtful if they shall get it, if Governor Neil interferes in the Ridgeway case.

Before the time had expired he lit out, and at the rate he was going when last seen, he has probably reached Salt Lake by this time.
