George L. Havens, of Bullion, is in Hailey; also Superintendent Miller, of the Philadelphia Company's smelting works, of Ketchum. Mrs. J. M. Graham, of Muldoon, was in town a day or two ago, and reported business in that direction fair. The smelter is almost ready to start.

Mr. Perkins and party left for Camas Prairie to-day, with guns and ammunition, on a hunting expedition, and promise to kill enough grouse to last the Hailey people a month. A gang of ball-tossers of Bellevue have associated themselves under the name of the Gate City Base Ball Club, and will soon issue a challenge open to "any town on the slough," for a match game for \$100 a side.

Work on the French boys' group of claims is being actively prosecuted under the direction of O. K. Westcott. The tunnel track is all laid, the heading cleaned out, and a satisfactory rate of progress is being made. The floor of Hailey Theater is being planed by the carpenters, and made perfectly smooth, for the roller-skates to glide upon. A heavy canvas will cover the entire floor during the balls and other entertainments. The skating rink will soon be opened.

H. Z. Burkhardt & Co. have received their new safe from Cincinnati, Ohio. It weighs 2,500 pounds, and is finely finished, has the firm name upon it, and is large enough for a bank. It will be used to keep the express moneys and valuables and Mr. Burkhardt's small change in. A new postal route has just been ordered established from the terminus of the Oregon Short Line to Hailey. This route will be changed from time to time, as the terminus is advanced, and when the railroad reaches Hailey the route will be discontinued, or the present routes merged into it.

J. O. Swift & Co. began to-day to transfer by freight-teams all their merchandise stock from the store in Hailey to their stores in Muldoon and Bullion. They will be through in about a week when the store will be given possession to Messrs. Willman & Walker, who will open October 1, with a large stock of general merchandise. A meeting of the teachers and friends of the Hailey Sunday school will be held to-morrow (Friday) evening at 8 o'clock, sharp, at Mrs. Dollarhide's, to take into consideration a proposition to procure a library for the school. The proper disposition of the balance of the profits of the late festival, and other important business, will be discussed. All interested are requested to attend.

One More, Just One More! A delegate to the recent Republican County Convention was found out on the head of Trail Creek late last night, and brought to Ketchum by two prospectors who put him in their cabin. During the night they heard heavy groaning and striking a light found that he had entirely undressed and laid on top of the blankets and, becoming cold, had tried to cover up as all that was over him was his boots which he had pulled up tight under his chin. He was shaking from cold like an earthquake. Being awakened he said that he had not been drunk, but was so very, very sick that he feared he was dying and his last request was for one more drink. He is now improving.

### ANOTHER POSTAL INSPECTOR.

He Reports the Hailey Office All Right, And Will Recommend that it be Advanced to the Third Class.

James C. Metcalf, Money Order and Registry Inspector for the district which includes Idaho and 16 other States and Territories, and whose headquarters are at St. Louis, Mo., came in last Monday, to examine the Hailey postoffice. He completed his work last evening and left this morning for Vicksburg, Miss. He intended visiting the Bellevue office, but did not have time this trip. He made a complete examination of the books here, and reported everything correct. Owing to the large amount of business transacted by the Hailey office, he will recommend that it be raised to a third class office, and that compensation be allowed for clerk hire and rent. He added in his official report an expression of opinion, to the effect that the office was doing more registry business than many second-class offices, and that Postmaster Parsons was really conducting the office at a loss to himself. Mr. Metcalf came here unannounced, dropped into the postoffice as soon as he reached here, and after displaying his commission to Nathan Kingsbury, the clerk, who was alone in the office, began his investigations. This is the course pursued by all inspectors, as it is considered preferable, for the interest of the service, that postmasters should not be warned of their coming.

### CUPID IN THE MOUNTAINS.

### A TREAT IN STORE FOR US.

A First-Class Theatrical Combination to Visit Us Next Summer.

Mrs. I. Block, of Bellevue, was in Hailey to-day, paying good-bye visits to her friends here, preparatory to leaving for Salt Lake in a few days, to meet her brother, Fred Meyers, who will be on his way from San Francisco to the East, to take charge of Mrs. Langtry, the Jersey Lily, for her American engagement.

Mr. Meyers is an old type who, about 10 years ago "stuck" type side by side with the publisher of the TIMES, in the Sacramento Union office. One night "Fred" got a big disgust on, and throwing up his rule and composing stick, swore that he would never set another type. He has kept his word. He engaged in the theatrical agency business, and soon rose to the top notch, until now he refuses to have anything to do with less prominent stars than such as Adelaide Neilson, (deceased) the Bernhardt, and the Langtry. While in Salt Lake, last April, he promised the publisher of the TIMES that, next spring, he would organize a strong combination, with a foreign star at its head, and would bring it to Wood River, where it would appear in a huge circus tent, and play in Bellevue, Hailey, Ketchum, Galena, Vienna and Sawtooth.

### AGRICULTURAL.

Specimens of the Products of our Soil—A Paying Vegetable Garden.

Specimens of the product of Wood River soil are now on exhibition at Isaac Culp's Hotel, and the most interesting portion of the agricultural exhibit is a turnip which weighs about eight pounds. This turnip was grown upon Seamands' ranch, six miles below Hailey, on the Wood River bottoms. This ranch was located by Mr. Seamands upon the creek bearing his name, in the year 1879, before the towns of Bellevue and Hailey were laid off, and has been irrigated from Wood River by a large water ditch. The ranch includes 160 acres of ground of which 120 acres is reserved for pasturage and will this fall be sown to timothy and alfalfa, and 40 acres has been leased to Italians who have cultivated it all this season and realized large profits from the products.

There are large patches of ripe tomatoes upon the vines, and 55 acres in potatoes, turnips and all the hardy varieties of vegetables. The potatoes, of which there are 10 acres planted, will yield seven tons per acre and the Italians have had a ready market in Bellevue and Hailey for everything raised this summer, securing prices which would drive a Jersey farmer crazy from delight. The ranch is protected by Lookout Mountain from cold winds.

The Jewish Day of Atonement. This holiday, which is generally observed by all of the Jewish faith, will begin at 6 o'clock in the evening of September 22, and continue until the evening of the 23d. During that time S. J. Friedman's store will be closed.

### Bellevue's Last Hope Gone.

In the Supreme Court on the 11th instant, the motion to dismiss the appeal of the Board of Commissioners of Alturas county, from the mandamus issued by Judge Prickett, requiring them to remove the records to Hailey, was dismissed. This is understood to close the case forever, as far as all proceedings prior to the granting of the mandamus referred to is concerned. Bellevue's last hopes of receiving the county seat is therefore gone. The fight now is supposed (in the absence of reliable information) to be between Hailey and the old county seat.
