HERE AND THERE.

A traveler saw in Portland, Me., while waiting half an hour in a railroad station, a barrel of ale rolled into a saloon, an intoxicated man drink a hack-driver, and two men drink whisky from a bottle. He concluded it possible that the Maine prohibition law is sometimes broken in Portland.

Mr. and Mrs. Yarnall lived in the same house for forty years, at Media, Pa., without once speaking to each other, each adhering stubbornly to a resolution not to make the first advance toward reconciliation. When the husband was stricken by fatal illness the wife was asked to relent, but she refused, as did he, and death soon made their separation complete.

The London bakeries used to be visited by parish officers. Now they are controlled by Government inspectors not numerous enough for the efficient performance of the work. Recent investigations showed that many bakeries are in a horrid state. Three of the more lately built have water-closets in them and forty-five had accumulations of refuse under the troughs.

Prof. Ponfick, of Breslau, has been clearing up some of the popular doubts concerning mushrooms. He says that all the common ones are poisonous, but that cooking deprives them of much of their poison, though the water in which they are boiled should be carefully thrown away, and the eculeut washed in two or three waters. Dried mushrooms are only safe after four months' keeping.

In 1631 the Lord Mayor, at the instance of the Privy Council, took a careful census of London. The result showed 130,268 inhabitants. In 1636 what we know collectively as London contained 700,000 inhabitants. Sir William Petty estimated that by 1840 London would contain 10,718,800 souls, but that it would reach its maximum in 1880, and then begin to decline; but while it has only reached half his estimate, it shows no sign of decline. The population of the city proper has declined 62,000 in twenty years, and is now 20,000 less than in the reign of James I.

The geological survey of Great Britain is proceeding at so rapid a rate that it has been computed by Prof. Ramsay that the mapping of the solid and superficial portions of England and Wales which still remain unsurveyed will be completed, on the scale of one inch to a mile, eighteen months from the present time; that of Ireland in six and a half years, and that of Scotland, to which seven surveyors are to be transferred on the completion of the English survey, in eleven years. The re-survey, however, for those portions of England and Wales which were originally only surveyed for their solid geology will then take, it is reckoned, twenty years.

A London paper says: "Sir Garnet Wolseley's action in first feigning to take measure in the direction of Aboukir and then promptly descending on Port Said and Ismailia, is in accordance with maxims he has himself embodied in his 'Soldier's Pocket Book.' He keeps his counsel that his army, and even the staff round him, should be not only in ignorance of his real intentions, but convinced that he aims at totally different objects from what are his true ones. He adds that, 'What you lead your army to believe will soon be credited by the enemy, whom it will reach by means of spies or through the medium of those newly-invented curses to armies, I mean newspaper correspondents.' In another part of his book Sir Garnet points out how by spreading false news among the representatives of the press a General may use them to deceive an enemy."

A letter has lately been published by several Parisian newspapers, signed Alfred Naquet. Alfred Naquet is a leading Republican Deputy, and the inventor of a dye for the hair. A prominent Parisian contemporary having called attention to the possible identity of the legislator and inventor, M. Naquet wrote a letter avowing the fact. M. Naquet says that he combines the occupation of Deputy and chemist, and that his devotion to science is as indelible as his hair dye. He further claims to be a public benefactor, because most hair dyes are injurious to health, whereas his own transforms the color of the hair without causing the death of the dyer. Feeble humanity, says M. Naquet, will dye its hair. It is an unrepudiated weakness, but that is no reason why the punishment of death should dog the dyer's footsteps. M. Naquet does not dye his own hair, but he confesses to have passed a happy quarter of an hour when he discovered a compound, harmless in its nature, yet potent to transform white hair into black, brown, or any other color, at the dyer's will.
