MR. AINSLIE'S INFAMOUS BILL.

The bill introduced in Congress by Mr. Ainslie, to create a gigantic monopoly that would own all the water in EVERY LIVING STREAM, including springs, creeks, rivers, etc., situated between American Falls on the east and the Middle Fork of the Boise, on the west, is reprinted to-day, that every reader of the TIMES may judge for himself of the extent of the proposed steal.

According to the provisions of this bill, the Idaho Land and Irrigation Company would have owned every spring, creek, or river in the vast and enormously rich Wood River mining region; the same in the Lost River region; the same in the Little Wood River region; the same in the Big and Little Smoky region; and the same in the Rocky Bar and Atlanta region.

Nor is this all. That company would also have had the right to take up every alternate section of land within the limits of the territory above outlined, whether the said land was agricultural, or desert, or timber.

This bill was introduced in the House on the 30th of January, of this year, long before ex-Governor Pound's bill was introduced as a substitute. Mr. Ainslie's bill was such an atrocious measure that the committee on Public Lands refused to report it at all, and had a substitute drawn up instead.

A MYSTERIOUS AFFAIR.

An Entire Stranger Arrests a Man at a Party, Robs Him of All His Property, then Sets Him at Liberty.

Last Friday evening the ranchers in Lower Wood River valley gave Mrs. Lieutenant Galbraith a surprise party, on the occasion of her departure for Boise. When the surprisers got to Mr. Black's residence, the home of Mrs. Galbraith's parents, they began to dance, and had got through one quadrille set, when one of the men stepped up to one of Mr. Black's ranch-hands, and pointing a revolver at his breast with one hand, while presenting a pair of handcuffs with the other, ordered the man to put them on, saying: "You are my prisoner."

The man did as he was bid, and followed the supposed detective out. A couple of hours later Mr. Black's man returned, in company with the detective, and demanded his wages. Mr. Black paid him at once, and the man, taking his saddle-horse, new saddle and clothes, left with the detective. The two then went to a store a couple of miles away, and began drinking. Early in the morning the man returned to Mr. Black's on foot, and stated that he had got away from the detective, but had left his horse, saddle, bridle, and every cent of money that he had with him. A couple of days later the man started out Boise way, with a pack animal, and passed Jones's, on Camas Prairie, the next day.

When the man came back to Black's, the morning following his arrest, a party of six ranchers, armed with rifles and revolvers, started out to capture the alleged detective, whom they supposed to be nothing more than a bold thief. After riding a few miles they saw him lying in the grass, near the road, and demanded an explanation of his conduct. The alleged detective coolly replied that he was an officer and threatened to blow off the top of any man's head who interfered with him. The ranchers thereupon returned home.

The detective's presence at the ball is accounted for in this way: In the afternoon he walked into Mr. Brown's house, near Mr. Black's, and asked to be permitted to rest awhile. This was allowed, and he was even asked to stay to supper and until morning. As the Browns went to the surprise party, they took the detective along. The whole affair is most mysterious.
