THE COURTROOM.

How It Has Been Got Ready for the Present Term.

A temporary curtain has been hung across the front of the stage, in Hailey Theater, which will prevent the absorption of heat from the main hall into the roof over the stage.

A temporary platform has also been constructed in front of the stage, for the accommodation of Judge Prickett and Clerk Richardson, and the weatherboarding lining and calsonining will render the room quite comfortable during the term of court.

A heavy canvas has been laid over the entire floor, to both protect the roller-skating floor from injury and to deaden the noise of the constant passing in and out of witnesses, jurors and others during the sessions.

Judge Prickett arrived in town yesterday, and Mr. Richardson, clerk of the court, arrived this morning. Upon the opening of the last term of court there were 110 cases on the calendar, but many of the number were of no great importance, and were settled without trial, while others required very little consideration in court or went by default. Of the 110 cases, 10 criminal and 45 civil cases were carried over to the present term. In addition to the above there are upon the docket 26 new civil cases, and probably a dozen more will be entered during the term, while about a dozen new criminal cases are expected to be received from the grand jury before which are now several cases for murder. It is easy to foresee that Judge Prickett cannot clear the calendar—possibly not by half—as the cases for the present term are mostly jury trials and more important than those of the last session.

Every case postponed which involves realty or mining interests defers investment and developments, in this section, and is a drawback to the country in general. The increasing settlement of Alturas county and investment of capital in various enterprises entails increased litigation, each year, and it is not possible that the country can longer prosper unless an additional judge be appointed for Idaho, who shall be settled permanently in Hailey, and hold court and chambers for such a length of time as to settle all litigation without unnecessary delay. This can be done and court held also in Lemhi and Cassia counties by the same judge.

All habeas corpus and injunction cases from this section now go to Boise, while were a resident judge assigned to Hailey, all such actions would be settled here and time and expenses thus saved to the people. Alturas, Lemhi and Cassia counties want Judge Prickett.

A Natural Pyramid of Copper.

Among the many interesting specimens of ore designed by Arizona miners for the Denver Exposition, the one shipped by Copper Queen Co. certainly occupies a foremost position. The specimen in question is one solid mass weighing two tons. It is of pyramidal form, about eight feet high, and two and a quarter by three feet thick at the base. On one side, about midway between the base and the apex, is a recess—the only interruption in its symmetrical shape. At this recess is a miniature cave 16 inches deep, 7 inches high and 9 inches wide. It is in the form of an assayer's muffle. The sides and roof are covered with beautiful stalactites. The carbonate ore with which this peculiarly attractive piece is composed assays from 23 per cent to 25 per cent.
