HONOR TO WHOM HONOR IS DUE.

During the last two weeks, when flour has been in such great demand that consumers would have literally paid ANY price for it, the merchants named, who happened to have a couple of tons of flour that they could spare, sold it at the same price that they would have charged for it if it had been ever so plenty. And, although quite short themselves, they never hesitated to respond promptly to orders from here. Thanks to them, much annoyance (to put it mildly) was avoided, and the people of Hailey have been enabled to patiently await the arrival of new flour.

THE RAILROAD.

It is Gradually Advancing Toward Hailey—Mr. Banfield Liable to Begin Any Day.

Martin L. Donohue is in town from Kilpatrick's grading camp, on the Wood River branch of the O. S. L. Railroad, 20 miles below Hailey. He reports that the contractors are confident that all the grade from Shoshone City to Hailey will be completed within five weeks from the present time, and all the graders will then be moved to the O. S. L. railroad grade between Shoshone and Boise, when through grading; but that the rock or rather the lava cuts will not be finished this winter unless the pay of the men working upon them is increased to \$3 a day per man and good miners are employed—which can be done at that price. As it is, no regular force of men can be kept at work at present prices. Men come to camp broke, and accept work, only until pay-day, and then leave. The present working force is composed nearly altogether of coons and daogoes—negroes and Italians who put in their labor mechanically and live under privations and upon such scanty food as no white laborer who is capable of a full day's work can tolerate. Desertions from the force are of daily occurrence, and there is a continual influx of new and unskilled hands and an exodus of old hands to Boise. Kilpatrick's headquarters and laborers will soon be removed from the camp, now 20 miles below Hailey, on Willow creek, to 45 miles below, or near to Shoshone City, and from there to the main line west from Shoshone, but the rock contracts will continue on the Wood river line until finished—which, it seems, at the present rate of work, will require until March or April.

Frank George, a sub-contractor, has 24 teams and crews of men to correspond at work on the grade toward Hailey. He has been working heretofore with his headquarters nine miles below Bellevue, and Wednesday next will move his camp to within 10 miles of Hailey, which is the nearest point yet established to Hailey. He will work 16 teams and men in proportion, and will grade an average of a mile every two weeks. Mr. Reinhardt, another sub-contractor, is at work 20 miles below Bellevue, employing 70 teams, and working from Silver creek bridge toward Hailey at the rate of a mile per day. J. M. Banfield will start work on the grade at Hailey and work toward Frank George's camp, as soon as the engineer arrives here and sets the grade-stakes. He is expected to-day.
