NO PUBLIC BUILDINGS WANTED NOW.

The subject of erecting public buildings in Hailey is again being discussed, but there is no doubt that the prevailing public sentiment is opposed to the taking of any steps in the matter. The county is heavily in debt, the current expenses are increasing rapidly, all the taxpayers feel poor, and are unwilling to assume any other obligations than those with which they are already burdened. It is true that a comparatively heavy sum must, for the lack of public buildings, be paid for the rent of buildings for public use, and that our records are in an unsafe place; but it is doubtless, in the present state of our county finances, better to bear with this than to incur a heavy indebtedness to build a courthouse that may, in a few years, be inadequate to our needs.

Two years hence the county will be more fully developed, a correct estimate can be formed of our taxable wealth, and a courthouse and jail commensurate with our needs can be erected.

FEES THAT SHOULD BE INCREASED

The TIMES again calls the attention of our legislators to the existing necessity of increasing the pay of the Sheriff of Alturas county for the criminal business of his office. During the past two years the criminal business has quadrupled in this county, but the pay—never too large—has not been increased. This disproportion has greatly crippled the Sheriff, and probably compelled him to forego to arrest and prosecute many who should have been brought to justice. This, while a saving of expense at the start, will, in the long run, result in bringing our peace officers into disrepute and our laws into contempt, to the permanent injury and ultimately greater burdening of our taxable property.

The Sheriff should be liberally paid. Any man who has to, figuratively speaking, take his life in his own hands in protecting a community against lawlessness, should be liberally paid; and there is hardly any danger of the Legislature's doing too much in the way of compensating the Sheriff of any county for his services in criminal cases. In such a rapidly growing community as this, which is so apt to be overrun by lawless characters, the compensation should be more liberal than in older and more settled communities where crime seldom ruffles the even tenor of life.

The Sheriff's fees in criminal cases should therefore be greatly increased.

SURVEYING A NEW ROAD.

Central Pacific Surveyors Running Another Line to Wood River.

It begins to look as if the Central Pacific Railroad Company really meant to give us direct communication with San Francisco, after all. A surveying corps which started from Winnemucca a couple of weeks ago, to survey a route to Wood River via Boise, have reached the mouth of Sucker creek. The Boise Statesman says that they are provided with a fine outfit, and report that they have made very rapid progress in running the line. Their instructions are to run directly from the mouth of Sucker Creek to Boise City. From Boise a line will be run southeast toward the Wood River country. It is stated the merchants of San Francisco and the railroad officials have determined that the interests of both demand the construction of a branch which will secure to San Francisco the continued trade of Southern Idaho, the transfer of which to the East is threatened by the Oregon Short Line. Since the settlement of Idaho it has purchased from San Francisco over one hundred million dollars' worth of goods, and now, when there is every prospect of largely-increased demands, San Francisco and the Central Pacific road have shaken off their lethargy and mean business. Whether or not the construction of the line from Winnemucca to Boise City and beyond will be realized is a question for consideration; but, as yet, there seems no reason to doubt the good faith of the projectors. The engineers report the route, as far as surveyed, perfectly feasible.

Where Have Our Dogs Gone?

During the past three weeks there has been a noticeable diminution in the number of dogs in town, and as none went away on the stages, it has puzzled a few observers to know what became of them. Yesterday two Chinamen started out, offering for sale some very novel-shaped sausages at extremely low prices. Being closely questioned as to where they bought the meat, one of them finally confessed that "him made of welly-lice tlog—heepe kletchee." The TIMES denounces this sausage to place the restaurant-keepers on their guard. The Chinese are no doubt wintering largely on domestic animals.
