MEAGER REPORTS FROM OHIO AND IOWA.

Ohio Probably Gone Democratic—Governor Hoadley's Majority—Republican Gains in Iowa.

CLEVELAND, O., Oct. 10.—The result of the election is still unsettled. The Democrats claim Governor Hoadley's election by 9,000 majority, and claim the Legislature, thus securing at least one United States Senator.

DES MOINES, IOWA, Oct. 10, 2 p. m.—The entire returns here to date indicate an increased Republican majority in the Legislature.

The Republican majority on joint ballot will be between 40 and 50.

The People vs. Esther M. Slosson.—Indicted for arson. Defendant arraigned and ordered to plead tomorrow, at 2 p. m.

W. H. Athos vs. Joseph Loving.—Placed on the calendar. Default and judgment entered for \$95.50 and costs.
