THE NATION'S ANNIVERSARY

HOW IT WILL BE CELEBRATED IN HAILEY.

The Belleveues Coming In Force—A Curious Glimpse Over the Program—Etc.

The school boys (and all the boys who wish) will act as a guard of honor for the cars. They will be headed by a five-and-drum corps composed of Charlie Taylor and Aleck Roberts, and will be furnished two flags apiece by the committee of ladies. Such boys as have guns or swords are requested to bring them along to the hall; and all children who intend to participate—both the boys and girls—must be at the Theater by 9 o'clock, prompt, the morning of the Fourth.

HAILEY COMING.

Of course, there never has been a doubt about it, but the people of Bellevue will come to Hailey en masse, this Fourth, to return the compliment paid

them last Fourth. Commander Red-sull, of the Bellevue Post, G. A. R., writes that he will bring a detail of 15 or 20 men and 15 stand-of-arms. There will also be a handsome car the exact nature of which is not stated, and a long line of carriages and people on horseback.

The miners of Broadford and Bullion will also come—as well as many from up the river and from Deer Creek, Rock Creek, and tributary camps.

THE PROGRAM.

The program, as published elsewhere in these columns, will be faithfully executed.

The procession will form on upper Main street, the head resting at the Theater, and proceed along Main street to Croy, thence to Second avenue, to Bullion, and to the grounds where the literary exercises will take place. A splendid grand stand and shady arbor have been erected there, and there will be fruit, ice cream and other refreshments, at regular rates.

After the literary exercises the horse-races will begin, and the ladies' driving match, men's footrace, and the dog race, will come off.

While these shall be going on, the match game of base ball will take place on upper Main street, and preparations will be making for the procession of Horribles, or Horniquibriniques.

This will fill up the day until supper-time. After supper a brief rest of two or three hours will be vouchsafed the weary community, after which their attention will be divided between the fire company's ball and the fireworks.
