THE NEWS.

HOW IT WAS RECEIVED IN THIS CITY.

Amid General Rejoicing, Company F Fired a Salute of 44 Guns, the Brass Band Played National Airs—Free Ball and Supper at the Hot Springs. The news of the passage of the House bill admitting the Territory to Statehood was received in this city with general rejoicing. The telegram conveying the news had scarcely been received at this office when the whole town's population seemed to know all about it; and people began to congregate on the streets to congratulate each other, and cheer after cheer for the new State rent the air. "Old Glory" was at once run up on every flagpole in town, and preparations were made to call out the Brass Band and hold a public meeting.

About this time, however, Charles F. Carlson, the new manager of the Hailey Hot Springs, and Harry Strahorn, of Chicago, son of the principal owner, arrived from the Springs and claimed the privilege of giving a free dance and supper in commemoration of the event. The request being conceded, the preparations for a public meeting ceased. A call was, however, issued for a firing squad of Company F to assemble for the purpose of firing a salute of 44 guns in honor of the new State; and the band boys were summoned to give a selection of national airs on Main street.

It was nearly five o'clock when the news was received, and probably an hour later before the people were apprized of the free ball and supper. Hence it was too late to secure any livery stock, as it had been sent out on the range for the night, and only three hacks could be secured to transport visitors to the Springs. This was woefully insufficient, and many intending to go were compelled to relinquish their intention after waiting for a hack from one to three hours. The Hot Springs hack, which has seating capacity for only 10, carried as many as 21 passengers per trip, and made a round trip every half-hour. Every private rig was in demand, and not a few persons walked to the Springs and back. Over 200 visited the Springs during the night, and fully one-half of them participated in the dance and ate supper there. Dancing began about 10:30, and continued until 5 o'clock this morning.

Messrs. Carlson and Strahorn, assisted by ex-Governor Hamilton, of Illinois, and a number of ladies, received the guests and succeeded most admirably in making them feel welcome. Mr. Carlson was especially indefatigable, being here, there and everywhere, saying that he wished every one present would for the time being, feel as if he owned a part of the house. He impressed all as being the right sort of a man for the place, and before the night was far advanced and the boys had got themselves outside of many jolts of good old rye or Bourbon he must have been gratified at the way in which they had construed his words. Some of them felt not as if they owned a part, but the whole of the establishment. Still there was no disorder, no quarreling; as the people of Wood River are invariably law-abiding and well-behaved, under all circumstances.

THE IDAHO "MILISH."

One of Its Members Sheds Blood While on Duty.

Company F of the Idaho Militia, has not received its "baptism of fire," yet a member of it has shed blood in the discharge of his duty since his enlistment. It is Drill Sergeant Clynne, who had about one and a-half inches of a bayonet jabbed into the thick part of the right leg, last evening, in this wise: Although bayonets have come for every militiaman, many of them are unprotected with scabbards, and carried through the belt between it and the person, the point stuck out almost at right-angles. A militiaman whose bayonet stuck out in this manner stood to the right of Sergeant Clynne. The latter having discharged his gun, arose, just as his subordinate dropped into position to fire, and the latter's bayonet penetrated the flesh of the non-commissioned officer. Dr. Figgins, commander of the company, being present, dressed the wound at once; and, although Sergeant Clynne lost somewhat of blood he insisted on going out to the Springs with the crowd, where he was, though lame, as lively as any. The fact is that, having served in the regular army five years, and suffered from one arrow and two bullet-wounds, Sergeant Clynne does not much mind such a little thing as a jab from a bayonet. He is lame to-day, and laying off; but knocks about the streets.
