The principals in the enterprise are Lewis Brothers, formerly steel manufacturers in England. Chicago, Pittsburg and Wales are to supply capitalists for the enterprise.

### A FREE TRADE TARIFF.

It would infallibly increase Prices of Foreign Goods.  
American Economist.

Every student of the tariff question should keep an eye out to observe carefully the effects of the new bill. One feature in its operation is becoming prominent, which has a vital significance in the tariff controversy. That feature is the noticeable decline in the price of foreign goods. When the free trader insists that the tariff is a tax he assumes that, with the removal of the duty, the consumer could buy the "taxed" article cheaper by just the amount of the tariff on it. The unsoundness of this assumption is just now being practically illustrated under the McKinley bill. Custom house officers report a decided falling off in the valuation of imports, particularly in the classes, like cutlery and worsted, on which duties were most largely increased. This result proves that it is the existence of the tariff which, in part at least, causes the low price of foreign goods. It follows, therefore, that prices of foreign merchandise would go up if the tariff were removed. Consequently the consumer would not buy his goods at the present low foreign price. That prices would rise abroad with the removal of the tariff was proved by the removal of the duty on coffee, which hardly declined in this country when made free. The same phenomenon is now seen in the price of sugar, made free by the McKinley bill. The free trade Philadelphia Record of February 10 contained a long article announcing in bold headlines that the "price of sugar rises," and that "the removal of the duty acts as a boom-

rang." It goes on to tell how the people expected to get the full benefit of the removal of the sugar duties, and adds:

"Meantime the foreign producers and dealers in raw sugars, realizing the prospect for an enlarged consumption of sugars at relatively low prices in this country, and knowing what was going on in the United States sugar markets, proceeded to anticipate the effect of the demand by putting up prices."

Now, this is just the point to which we wish to call the Record's attention. If the consumer does not get the benefit of the removal of sugar duties, he certainly would not in case woollens, for example, were made free. We depend almost entirely upon foreign countries for our sugar, and the annual import may be almost regarded as a fixed quantity. It is not likely that free sugar will materially increase our purchases from abroad, for the increased domestic production under the new bounty system will probably more than counterbalance any increase in consumption which may follow lower prices. Yet the Record says that the price of sugar goes up as soon as it is made free.

Woollens would have much greater cause to advance in price if they were made free, or if the duty were materially reduced. Our own woollen mills, protected by the tariff, supply the greater part of the domestic demand. If the tariff wall were thrown down, there would immediately follow an immense expansion in the demand upon foreign manufacturers for woollens. A great advance in prices abroad must be the result. The consumer would not buy his clothing at present foreign prices. What then becomes of the free trader's tariff tax? The argument is fortified at one end by the decrease in the price of foreign cutlery concurrently with a higher tariff on it, and at the other end by the Record's assertion that the fall in the price of sugar will not equal the duty which is to be abolished. These cold, hard facts stare the "reformer" in the face, and flatly contradict his tariff tax theory.
