LYNCH LAW IN NEVADA.

THE WOULD-BE MURDER OF NASH HANGED BY A MOB.

Particulars of the Shooting—Ortiz Taken From Jail and Hanged—He Meets Death Coolly—Nash's Condition Favorable.

Last Thursday night Officer Richard Nash of Reno, was shot and dangerously, if not fatally, wounded while in discharge of his duty in front of the Grand Central Hotel, by Louis Ortiz, a Spaniard. Ortiz, who has an unsavory reputation, and has been arrested, and fined and imprisoned on several occasions for being implicated in cutting and shooting affrays, according to the Journal, was ordered to leave town some time since. He returned Thursday evening and stopped at the Grand Central. The house was crowded with guests and Ortiz was given the bartender's bed. He was under the influence of liquor and would not remain in bed. The proprietor of the house, Dan O'Keefe, cleared the bar-room and Ortiz went out with others. On the front porch Ortiz drew a pistol, and so far as known, without any provocation, commenced firing. The ball struck Tom Welch, inflicting a flesh wound near the hip. He fired a second shot as the bartender, Thomas McCormick, attempted to disarm him. The bullet struck Officer Nash in the right groin, for whom it was no doubt intended. Nash, though realizing that a bullet had been lodged in his body, persisted in his effort to arrest Ortiz, who was finally knocked down and disarmed by McCormick. Ortiz rose to his feet and started to run. He was followed by McCormick, who again felled him with a well-directed blow, and held him until O'Keefe and Nash arrived and arrested him. Ortiz was taken to jail and Nash was taken to his home and a physician called to attend him.

The tragedy, which occurred late Thursday night or early Friday morning, culminated last night in the lynching of Louis Ortiz, the would-be assassin.

The following particulars of the hanging are received by special telegraph from Allen Bragg of the Gazette: Last night about 10 o'clock it was plain to be seen by close observers that something was going to happen. Prominent citizens were misled about their usual haunts, and at about 11:45 a hundred or more men were seen coming down First street, preceded by an advance guard who stopped

every pedestrian they met and ordered him back. The men comprising the committee were all disguised by having handkerchiefs tied across their faces. They immediately took up their line of march across the iron bridge toward the Court-house, leaving guards at either end of the bridge.

They quietly filed into the corridor leading to the jail, where several raps attracted the attention of Under-Sheriff Laughlin, who, suspecting nothing unusual, opened the door, and was at once covered by half a dozen or more revolvers. The Deputy Sheriff at first, seemed to be inclined to show fight, but finding himself at so great a disadvantage, he inquired what was wanted.

He was immediately seized by a half a dozen or more men and told to give up the keys to the jail. He refused, when they were taken from his pocket, and while the Under Sheriff was scrounging held end covered with revolvers the advance guard quietly unlocked the cell occupied by Ortiz, and he was told to get up as he was wanted down town. "All right," replied the culprit. When he was led from the jail they took Ortiz to the iron bridge and asked him if he had anything to say, to which he replied: "I would like a glass of water and a priest."

He then gave his name and told where his relatives resided, and requested that they be written to, stating that he was dead, but not telling them the manner of his death. He was informed that a priest was not present and that his request in that particular could not be complied with. He was then given a drink of water, also a flask of whisky, which he drank eagerly. His feet and hands were quickly tied, a rope thrown over a cross beam of the bridge and the command of "haul away" was given. He was soon suspended between heaven and earth and in a few moments life was extinct.


Not a murmur or a cry escaped him, but with a sickly smile almost satanic he requested them to hurry. Exactly at 12:30 a. m. he was suspended between heaven and earth. The body swung rapidly round and round, his livid face upturned to the starry firmament. With glassy eyes his gaze fixed, as if trying to penetrate the great futurity, to which he had given so little thought during his reckless life. The body swung to and fro, with now and then a convulsive movement that sent a thrill of horror through the crowd. The sheen of his familiar greasy leather coat shone with a peculiar brilliancy.

The committee then quietly dispersed and went to their respective homes. Coroner Peers and Undertaker Saunders cut the body down at an early hour this morning, and nothing remains to be done but to hold an inquest and bury the remains of Ortiz from the sight of man forever.

Ortiz was considered a very bad man. He figured in some shooting affrays in Winnemucca and had been in the hands of the local officers of Reno several times. He had a mania for getting into rows.

The lynching is universally approved by the best citizens of the town. Reno is very quiet to day and everything is moving along as usual.

Officer Nash is resting easy to day and his recovery is probable. It is thought the bullet did not penetrate the abdominal cavity. Time alone will determine the result of the wound, but the physicians are of the opinion that there is no immediate danger.
