**OPPOSED, BECAUSE UNREASONABLE.**

A remonstrance against the passage of a bill pending in the Idaho Legislature, to reduce local passenger fares in this State to a fraction above two cents per mile, was circulated in town to day, and signed by about everybody to whom it was presented.

This action was taken not because the people here are opposed to the regulation of railroads, but because the bill is too radical. If the proposition made was to reduce the rate to four cents, or even to 3 1/2 cents per mile, the people of Wood River would favor it. But the rate proposed is almost as low as the lowest, and therefore totally unfit for the frontier.

If the Legislature will pass a bill to reduce the rates on freight, in and out, very few, if any, will protest against it.

**STEWART'S MINING LAW.**

In Senator Stewart's new mining bill, which passed the Senate on December 22d, there are seven sections, the first of which changes the commencement of the assessment year from January 1st to October 1st. The second section treats of patents for mineral claims and the methods of procuring them. The third section provides that the United States mineral surveyors may administer oaths to applicants for patents. The fourth section prescribes the method of determining whether land for which a patent is sought is mineral or non mineral. The fifth section refers to surface claims for mill sites and dumping grounds, and the method for procuring title for the same.

**AS GOOD AS DEAD.**

Although there is much ado, both in and out of Congress, over the proposition to repeal the Sherman law by virtue of which 4,500,000 ounces of silver are purchased monthly, we consider it entirely unlikely that the proposition will pass this Congress. The bill is still in its first stage, and must be reported, discussed and passed in one house before it can be put through a like process in the other. It is now in the hands of the House committee. If it should be reported favorably, its passage could be delayed for fully three weeks. If it passed it would go to the Senate, where it would be delayed at every step, Senator Stewart alone being prepared to hold the floor for two weeks in opposition to it.

The bill is therefore almost as good as dead, since the session can only last seven weeks longer.

The weather is clear and bright, with scarcely more than sufficient snow for good sleighing, and the roads are in fine condition. Under such circumstances all our people, both old and young, entered with rather more than usual zest and earnestness into such amusements as can be found in such country neighborhoods as this.

A notable and unprecedented feature of the New Year's celebration here, which is indeed beyond comparison with anything ever devised here in the way of social recreations, was the banquet given solely for the old bachelors on New Year's Day. The credit for this new and commendable departure in social customs, as well as the lasting gratitude of that proscribed and unfortunate class, is due to the compassionate forethought and the generous hospitality of Mrs. Antonio Vaso. No married people were included in the list of those invited; but Mrs. Vaso had quietly—unbeknownst as it were—prepared a most delightful surprise for us by engaging, for the express purpose of entertaining us, a charming bevy of our prettiest, brightest and most vivacious young ladies—Misses Rosa Bell, Daisy Gray, Addie Matthews, and Mabel Bell, afterward supplemented by the addition of Misses Ella and Olive Pearson. The young ladies evinced most remarkable originality and infinite versatility of resource in providing amusement for us. And what memories of olden times! and what thoughts of the might have-been variety! must have filled the minds of the old gray-beard while being so delightfully inducted into all the mysteries of the Dismal Swamp, the Cedar Forest, Cross Questions, Hunt the Button, etc., etc. How irresistibly ludicrous in its manifestations is that fondest of the lingering delusions of an old bach—that he can still make himself solid with the girls! There will ever exist, however, a green place in our memories for Mrs. Vaso and the young ladies who so pleasantly contributed to the enjoyment of the occasion.

The new four-set schoolhouse on the Island has at last been completed, and a movement is under way to start up the Lost River Lyceum and Debating Society again; but, as dancing is by far the most popular form of amusement here, there will probably be but little interest taken in the literary exercises, when the services of the string band and organ can be secured.

Notwithstanding the fact that this has so far been a very mild winter, we are again experiencing the same old, vexatious delays in the mail service, especially, between here and Wood River. Having but just received mail from Hailey three weeks' old, we conclude that the road is bad over the Trail Creek Divide and that the mail was conveniently left by the road side until such time as the carriers could conveniently bring it on. All the while, the route via Blackfoot has been open and free of snow and mail from Hailey will reach us here by that route in precisely the same time as by way of Ketchum, and with far less risk of snow blockades and delays on the way. A letter sent from here to New York will receive an answer more promptly and within less time than one sent from here to Hailey. This has been the condition of affairs, every winter, since the time when memory runneth not to the contrary; and, after exhausting all the resources of Lost River profanity in attempting to do justice to the subject, we have at last meekly accepted it as one of the hard conditions of our environment—but blamed if we like it a bit.

**TO BECOME A PRINCESS.**

Miss Virginia Fair to Marry a Polish Prince.

The San Francisco Examiner states that Miss Virginia (better known as "Birdie") Fair, youngest daughter of ex Senator Fair of Nevada, is to marry the grandson of a Polish king. The Examiner publishes a two-column article about the coming nuptials, and gives as the name of the lucky for-

eigner Louis Leopold Charles Marie Andre Poniatowski, Prince of the blood and grandson of a King. The date of the wedding is not yet announced. The prospective bride is not yet nineteen, and was born in Virginia City, Nev. At the age of 25 she will receive from her mother's estate \$1,500,000. Until that time she is paid monthly from her mother's estate \$2,500.

What she gets from her mother's estate—a million and a half—is expected to be only the smaller part of the fortune that will be hers. Her father, ex-Senator James G. Fair, is variously estimated to be worth from \$12,000,000 to \$20,000,000.
