Being Threatened with Destruction, the People Ask the Assistance of Hailey.

Word comes to the TIMES to the effect that Broadford will surely be destroyed unless immediate assistance is forthcoming.

The river is washing over the levee at Star gulch, just beyond the bridge, and flooding the region below.

The road to Broadford is already badly overflowed, and a few days more and much of the town of Broadford will be washed away.

The people of Broadford therefore ask the people of Hailey to send as many men as possible to give them a lift in cutting trees and brush and raising the levee sufficiently to confine the river to its bed.
