### THE STATE WAGON ROADS.

All the Contracts to Make Them Awarded.

The commission has awarded all the contracts to construct the proposed State wagon roads. The amount of the award is \$114,480, of which \$47,650 goes to Idaho contractors, and the remainder to contractors of Spokane, Wash., and Butte, Montana.

All the contracts for work in the Southern districts come within the appropriation; but in Idaho and other northern counties the cost of the roads will exceed the appropriation. In such localities the difference will have to be made good by private subscription.

The contractors are under bonds. They will begin work next May, and expect to have it completed by fall.

### Howells Shelling Peas.

I recall very fully the moment and the place when I first heard of Don Quixote. While as yet I could not connect it very distinctly with anybody's authorship, writes William Dean Howells in his literary autobiography in the January issue of Home Journal, I was sent too young to conceive of authorship, even in my own case, and wrote my miserable verses without any notion of literati, or of anything but the pleasure of seeing them actually come out rightly rhymed and measured.

The moment was at the close of a summer's day just before supper, which in our house we had lawlessly late, and the place was the kitchen where my mother was going about her work, and listening as she could to what my father was telling my brother and me and an apprentice of ours, who was like a brother to us both, of a book that he had once read.

We boys were all shelling peas, but the story, as it went on, rapt us from the poor employ, and whatever our fingers were doing, our spirits were away in that strange land of adventures and mishaps, where the fevered life of the knight truly without fear and without reproach burned itself out. I dare say, my father tried to make us understand the satirical purpose of the book; I vaguely remember his speaking of the books of chivalry it was meant to ridicule; but a boy could not care for this, and what I longed to do at once was to get that book and plunge into its story.

### An Article that Should be Read by Everybody.

The leading article in the January Forum is "The Teaching of our Recent Economic Experiences," by David A. Wells. Mr. Wells has summed up the almost incalculable loss caused by the financial panic and analyzed the causes of it with a thoroughness that nobody else has attained. He finds the deep-lying cause of our fiscal and commercial dangers in the popular ignorance of financial and economic literature and experience on the part not only of the great body of the people but of otherwise well-educated men.

Professor Herbert Nichols, in "The Edge of the Future," McClure's Magazine for January. 
