

## MINES AND MINING

Directors of the United Tintic Mines company have levied assessment No. 5. It calls for half a cent a share.

After a long period of rest, the Rob Roy mine, five miles north of the Sheep Rock mine in Beaver county, Utah, has resumed operations.

Reports from the Fortuna Gold Queen are that the new adit is cutting the vein ten feet wide and exposing especially high values in the yellow metal.

It is reported that North Butte is to be exchanged for Anaconda, share for share. Both are now about \$38. This will give Anaconda control of nearly the entire Butte district.

Shipments of ore from the mines of Tintic the past week totaled 116 carloads, estimated at 5,800 tons, valued at \$145,000. This is compared with 123 carloads the previous week.

When the directors of the Victoria Mining company held their meetings at Salt Lake the other day they decided to resume the shipment of copper ore from the 900 level of the mine.

Shipments of ore the past week from the four leading producers of Park City amounted to a total of 1,960 tons, estimated at \$78,000. This is compared with 1,300 tons the week before.

While the Tintic Standard property in the eastern end of the Tintic district is still inactive, it is generally understood that everything will be in readiness for the resumption of work within the next week or ten days.

Max Dunn, an engineer from Spokane, Wash., has been making an inspection of the Black Eagle group of claims in the West range, in Beaver county, Utah, in all probability with a view of resuming development work at once.

Indications are that the Butte & Superior company for the month of April will break all production records and with the extraordinary price ruling for spelter this can only mean that profits likewise will surpass all previous figures, says the Boston News Bureau.

The drainage tunnel which the Wasatch Mines proposes to run from a point 15,000 feet down the Little Cottonwood from the Columbus tunnel will unwater the mine to a depth of 500 feet below the tunnel level and about 100 feet below the lowest workings in ore.

While making a recent inspection of the big territory, one of the directors of the King David company knocked off a piece of outcropping ore and brought it home for sampling. An assay made in Salt Lake gave returns of 6.5 per cent lead, 24.6 ounces silver and 30 cents in gold.

Utah people have reorganized the Bannock Gold Mining company at Butte to take over a property at the camp of Bannock, Mont. It is said the property has produced \$1,000,000, the ore averaging \$100 a ton. Samples on 112,000 tons estimated blocked out averaged \$10.90 a ton.

Nevada Copper Mining, Milling & Power company has completed the final arrangements with Mr. Nunn and his company, and actual construction work on a power line to this camp will be begun within the next ten days or not later than two weeks, says the Contact (Nev.) Miner.

Reliable word comes from both Bingham and Garfield that the big mine of the Utah Copper is again moving probably not far from its normal tonnage of 20,000 tons daily, and that the Magna and Arthur mills are operating night and day and probably not far from capacity.

Bringing up from Goldstrike, Utah's new camp in Washington county, a big specimen chunk of \$100,000 a ton ore, Rolla E. Clapp, H. G. Snyder and Fred Redding have returned to Salt Lake. They dug this sample out of a vein 250 feet from the surface and high-grade is being sacked at the 275-foot level.

Utah stockholders of the Jumbo Extension Mining company are in receipt of a notice of a special meeting to be held May 20 at Phoenix, Ariz., the purpose of which is to increase the capitalization from 1,200,000 to 1,750,000 shares and with 300,000 of the new shares patch up the Apex litigation now on with the Booth company.

It is given out by officials of the Alta Tunnel & Transportation company that four feet of carbonate ore is showing in the raise. This is at a point 900 feet in from the portal of the tunnel in Silver Fork of Big Cottonwood. The proposed course of the tunnel is toward the Prince of Wales and will make under the Michigan-Utah.

Since the Cardiff Mining company made its strike in the lower tunnel last October it has shipped approximately 1,500 tons of ore, which has netted the company about \$30 a ton, or \$45,000.

Production of ore by Tonopah mines the past week totaled 10,760 tons, estimated at \$219,640, says the Tonopah Miner.

Under the management of the new Clover Mining company, the sixth carload of ore has been shipped from the Polar Star property south of Wells, Nev. The last car was sampled in Salt Lake valley last week. It carried 30 per cent zinc for the 35-ton lot.

Word received from Superintendent Nebeker of the Leonora, Beaver county, Utah, is that last week he opened a fissure of high-grade zinc. Some of its samples up to 60 per cent. This rich stuff will be mixed with the ore on the stockpile and shipped.
