**HEAD OFFICIALS**

**TOUR NEW ROAD**

Monday the report became current that a train would arrive that evening bringing several of the officials of the Northern Pacific and G. & P. roads. The train arrived about seven-thirty that evening and was met at the depot by a good sized representation of the citizens of Salmon, as the officials were going to stay but a few minutes.

The train consisted of about six coaches altogether, being made up of the private cars of the different officials. In the party were President Hannaford, V. Pres. Shade, B. O. Johnson, of the G. & P. also the general manager of the N. P.; several of the directors and other heads of the different departments of the road.

There is no significance placed on this visit any more than on previous visits. It is probably only a trip of inspection. We have been inspected so often now that we are getting used to it. It is hoped, however, that they will see the condition of the road and decide to give it some attention in the way of some much needed repairs. The fact that the head officials of the N. P. are interested enough to come and inspect us so often encourages us to believe that the time is near, when our railroad facilities will be improved.

**JAMES HICKMAN**

Last Tuesday evening Coroner Doebler was notified by telephone from Leadore of the death of James Hickman. As near as the facts can be learned Mr. Hickman rode into the livery barn of George Martin at Leadore and dropped over dead. It seems that he had been troubled with his heart for some time. A doctor was called at once and pronounced his death due to valvular heart trouble. James Hickman was born in Montana about 49 years ago. For a num-

ber of years he was in the government service in the construction and navigation department in the Philippines. While there he met and married a lady who was also engaged in government work as a teacher. He was stationed at various places in the American possessions in the east, but his health failing he brought his family to America on a visit to his wife's people who resides near Logan, Utah. Hearing of the Carey Act project near Leadore he brought his family there about two years ago and settled on a ranch.

It was found that Mr. Hickman was a Mason and the Masonic lodge of Salmon was notified. Investigation showed that he was a member in good standing of a Masonic lodge in Hong Kong, China. Thursday morning two automobile loads of Masons of Salmon went up to Leadore and took charge of the funeral. He was buried in the old Indian burying ground at Leadore at 1:30 with the beautiful burial services of the Masonic order.

Mr. Hickman was a man highly respected by all who knew him, a devoted husband and father and a good Mason. He leaves a widow and three children to mourn his death. The sympathy of the entire community goes out to the bereaved ones.

**Highway Engineer Coming.**

In a letter received from State Highway Engineer E. N. Booth it is understood that he will visit Lemhi county in the interest of the Highway Commission sometime in September for the purpose of inspecting the proposed route of the Idaho-Montana Highway.

County Engineer Merritt has been sent a number of drawings by the State Highway Department showing the various standards of construction and it is the purpose of the County Road Supervisor to construct all of the roads up to the standards of the state so that all of the work will be uniform throughout the state.
