





READY TO REPULSE INVADING MEXICANS





MINES AND MINING

Further antimony activity is announced in Wild Horse canyon in Nevada.

The average price of electrolytic copper for the month of August was 18.941 cents, against 18.796 cents in July.

Shipments from the Park City mines last week totaled 2,634 tons, valued at \$105,000, compared with 1,727 tons the previous week.

It is claimed that the "Lose Josephine" mine in the Hanksville district, in southern Utah, has been found by Colorado prospectors.

For the second consecutive month the Miami Copper company produced in excess of 4,000,000 pounds, August total being 4,038,348 pounds.

Secretary Fitzgerald of the Lehi-Tintic said last week that preparations are under way to have the property in north Tintic resume work in the near future.

Inspiration Consolidated Copper company will have its mill in full operation by the end of this year, according to Arizona advices. With the fulfillment of its program the company will be turning out copper at the rate of fully 12,000,000 pounds a month.

Recently a prominent Utah mining operator was looking over the new mill construction work of the Tintic Milling company and afterwards said it will represent approximately \$150,000 investment. Already, he declares, the expenditures have reached probably \$75,000.

One of the best high-grade molybdenite showings of the entire intermountain region is situated in Humboldt county, Nevada, according to the reports that are coming from the Jack property, on the north end of Osgood mountain, twenty-four miles northeast of Golconda.

After an inspection of the properties of the Majestic Copper company in Beaver county, President John M. Dick of Boston said last week that work on large lines will be undertaken in a short time. He says that a syndicate of wealthy New York people has become interested.

Silver was given an impetus the past month or so through purchases made by the government. Purchases by director of the mint, from August 3 to September 3, inclusive, comprising the main takings by the government thus far this year, amounted to 2,675,000 ounces fine.

Owing to the lateness in the spring when the pipe line was completed, the hydraulic season of the Round Mountain Mining company was rather limited, the Tonopah Bonanza reports. The clean-up for August was practically the same as July, \$10,000 net, while the mine netted about \$4,000.

That the Anaconda company will have a 100-ton zinc reducing plant in operation within several weeks, with an estimated production of zinc in the form of a high-grade zinc special amounting to about 20,000 pounds daily, is the statement made by one apparently in close touch with affairs at the Washoe works.

Within at least fifty feet of driving the main tunnel of the Bingham-Tooele Mining company, the property of which is located at the head of Middle canyon in the Bingham district, will cut another large body of Jordan limestone, according to the estimates of the engineers that have been surveying the property for patent.

It is reported from Cache valley that the Moon property near Hyrum will soon ship another carload of zinc ore to the Salt Lake markets. The first sent down sampled 21 per cent zinc. This is not a marketable grade, so it was stored in Salt Lake and will be mixed with a car of the higher grade and the aggregate disposed of probably at a profitable price.

Among the more important happenings in the immediate vicinity of Lovelock during the past week, from a mining standpoint, have been the tightening of the Lincoln Hill deal, the clean-up at the Derby mill of the Delaware Mining company in the Seven Troughs district and the possibility of further antimony developments in Wild Horse canyon.

This is how the Boston Commercial looks at one of Utah's big mines: Utah Copper shares have been prevented from advancing by the continued heavy selling of foreign holders. It is probable that between \$8,000,000 and \$9,000,000 worth of Utah Copper shares have been liquidated in this market in the past eight months by French investors, who have felt that they were obliged to sell by the exigencies of the war.

The general public has little conception of the scope and far-reaching experiments in the wet reduction of complex zinc ores being conducted in the Washoe laboratories of the Anaconda Copper company, says a Butte correspondent. The progress of the experiments and testing work is such that from sources presumably close to Anaconda metallurgical circles comes the prediction that the Anaconda company is on the eve of revolutionizing the reduction of zinc ores.

Prince Consolidated of Pioche last week mined and shipped to the Salt Lake markets a total of fifty-four carloads of ore. This consignment is estimated at 2,700 tons and valued at near \$27,000. It is compared with thirty-six cars, or 1,800 tons the previous week.

With the object of constructing a twenty-four-inch cog railroad line from Wasatch to Alta, a distance of eight miles, preliminary papers have been drawn up for the incorporation of the Alta-Cottonwood Railway company. The capital stock is \$100,000.
