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HIS HOME PAPER DOES NOT WANT DAVIS.

The following article is taken from a recent issue of the American Falls Times, published in the home town of State Senator D. W. Davis, who recently announced himself as a candidate for the Republican nomination for governor. What some of his home people think of Mr. Davis may be interesting to the readers elsewhere. The article follows:

It is reasonable to presume that should David W. Davis be successful in being elected governor of Idaho, that two years' time would be sufficient for the taxpayers of the state to see the difference between a businesslike administration that a new and growing state like Idaho should have, and what it is now receiving at the hands of Governor Alexander, so far as it is possible for him to give, taking into consideration the conditions that Power county is now laboring under, under Mr. Davis' supervision. Beginning with the creation of Power county, Mr. Davis, as senator, had the naming of every county official and as a consequence has been the "dictator" of the affairs of the county from then until the present time. Taking the total indebtedness of the county from the time of its creation, something like \$50,000, and comparing that amount with the present indebtedness of the county, it will be seen that in the course of a very few years, unless there be a great change in affairs, the county will become hopelessly bankrupt. With the same businesslike administration of state affairs that require the most competent and careful attention of a shrewd business head, where would we be after two years of D. W. Davis' administration, who has not the ability to handle the affairs of so small a portion of the state as Power county? Our total indebtedness after three years a county, is more than \$200,000, and we are still going in the hole deeper and deeper every day.

OLD-TIME PROSPERITY HAS COME AGAIN.

The following story of railroad building and rivalry reads like old time prosperity that seems to have revisited the country even on its uttermost parts: Statements by H. U. Mudge, president of the Denver & Rio Grande, and A. H. Mobler, president of the Union Pacific, Thursday indicate that rival railroad interests may engage in a race to be the first to enter the Uintah basin in eastern Utah.

"We already have our surveys and have made many right of way filings," said Mr. Mudge. "We are ready to get on the job with brief notice. If the Salt Lake route or the Union Pacific start a road into the basin it will find us in there ahead. We expect to build the road, and we expect to be the first company operating in that valley."

More than twenty Republican Senators and members of the House of Representatives have united in an effort to hold off the stand-patters and their steam roller tactics, and in effect to serve notice on them that the few, to whom the Mark Hanna "faith" was delivered years ago, are not going to do with the Chicago convention this year what they did with the last Republican National Convention. The Republicans of the Middle West seem thus to realize that they must make of their party something more than a small commercial league, as in the days that are dead. They evidently believe that the old order's product, in national convention, would be a mere shadow in contrast with President Wilson, who now has nearly three years of exceptionally able and patriotic service in behalf of his countrymen to his credit and that the Democratic party is stronger today than ever before in the more than one hundred years of its existence.

Poultry experts urge those who are engaging in poultry to buy their settings at home, not to send away to Illinois or some other place for the privilege of paying a big price for an article that will not be any better than settings bought cheaply at home. This advice will be widely taken. But how are the prospective purchasers going to know who has settings for sale unless it is advertised in the local papers? Catch the idea?

GOVERNOR ALEXANDER INVITED TO SALMON.

If Governor Alexander can arrange the itinerary of his proposed southeastern visit so that he may come to Salmon he will be heartily welcomed by our townspeople. Residents of all the country around Salmon also would be glad to greet him here. The Governor has been doing good work for the development of Idaho and has carried to that public service great zeal and energy. He is committed to the proposition that there shall be built a north-and-south railroad. The improved highways building to which the whole state and every community therein is strongly committed has found in him an advocate and a firm believer. Salmon needs good wagon and automobile roads for its rapid development as well as a through railroad connection. The energetic governor of this state is in position to help us get these things the sooner if we deserve them. Let us show him that we do deserve them.

PRICE OF GASOLINE DOUBLES IN SIX MONTHS

Advances in gasoline are beginning to attract the attention of automobile owners who view with more or less alarm the fact that the indispensable fluid is now selling at 30 cents a gallon where one year ago the price was 14 cents. Dealers explain that this is because the production is not equal to the demand, which is a steadily increasing quantity. In addition to this prices of tires are also advancing, as well as cost of fittings and general equipment. One traveling salesman of an eastern oil house when asked when this advance in gasoline was going to stop, he replied: "Judging from present conditions, not until it reaches such a point that automobile owners will no longer buy, but house their machines."

One factor in the situation is that 18 months ago the Standard Oil company offered to supply crude oil at 25 cents a barrel to the many prospectors who were scattered over the oil fields. This was at a cost to them less than the expense incurred in oil locating, and resulted in getting most of them out of the prospecting business. Shortly thereafter, it was noted that the price of the crude article began to rise, and this morning it was quoted anywhere from \$1.01 to 1.75 per barrel. It is claimed that this move has more completely than ever put the control of the gasoline market in the hands of the Standard Oil, a condition made more favorable to them by the phenomenal increase in number of automobiles of all kinds.

Kerosene can to a very limited extent be used for propulsion purposes, but its action is too slow for economical use with automobile machinery as at present constructed. One make of machine does use kerosene, however, and dealers are inclined to the belief that the current exigency is likely to result in the directing of inventive genius toward devising an engine that will consume kerosene instead of gasoline with satisfactory results.

Cattle on the Range.

President Heard of the National Livestock association reports to that body at its present convention that he sees signs of closer understanding and better co-operation between the federal authorities and the stockmen for the use of the public range. This, he contends, will lead to the more serviceable use of the range, the removal of friction between the cattle and sheep raisers, and the production of more animals. This is a most desirable end. It has required many years of experience to bring about such a state of affairs, if, indeed, it be accomplished now. Twenty years ago the cattlemen of the west were warned of the shortsightedness of the policy they were pursuing, and was urged that some better method for the use of the open range be determined and adopted. Regulation of the range is the only sensible basis on which it may be made of greater use, and on it depends the perpetuity of the grazing industry.
