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BELGIUM AND KOREA.

If the coming political campaign in this country is to be an exercise in more or less ancient history it will not arouse that intense interest which is customary at a game of lawn tennis.

Elihu Root in his recent keynote speech in New York found occasion to criticize the Democratic administration at Washington because it did not protest against the invasion of Belgium by Germany.

The political leaders of both parties appear to be making issues without consulting the people. The Tribune believes that the people of the United States are satisfied to let the Belgian affair alone.

There are no doubt, war issues which can be discussed legitimately, but the invasion of Belgium is not one of them. We are precluded by the spirit of the Monroe doctrine from interfering unnecessarily in European entanglements and should interfere only when our own interests suffer.

The American people sympathize with Belgium, but they are not morally bound to challenge any nation to war because of Belgium. The nations directly involved are now engaged in settling the issue by the arbitration of war.

If we should follow the advice of those who urge us to "act" in the case of Belgium, we would be compelled to sign a "treaty" with regard to the "action" with Persia and her allies.

Our world is the western hemisphere. We shall do well if we meet fairly and solve justly all the legitimate issues without going far afield to rake up trouble about Belgium and Korea.

COUNTRY SCHOOLS AND CITY SCHOOLS.

Some surprise will spread over the faces of fathers and mothers in rural communities when they read the solemn avowal made in Detroit at a meeting of educators that the ordinary rural school is a menace to the health of pupils.

It was a Chicago man, who, in advocating a campaign for more sanitary rural schools, asserted the belief that pupils in country schools are healthier than pupils in city schools is erroneous.

And it was a New York university professor who declared that the school children of city slums as a rule are healthier than children who attend school in the country districts.

What the rural citizen will want to know is how far these explorers went from New York and Chicago to find country schools in such deplorable condition.

Another revelation at the same meeting carries more comfort, that the graduates from graded rural schools make better showing in advanced educational institutions than the average city student.

An observation that is perhaps correct is to the effect that lack of proper ventilation is the greatest menace of all, not only in schools, city as well as country, but also in many

homes. One never hears of sheep getting sick. Their good health more than from any other cause comes from always getting plenty of fresh air. Human beings are subject to the same rules of health as sheep. There are exceptions to all rules, we are told, all along the road from the cradle to the grave, and in this as in other comparative tests the reason for such differences is most likely to be found in individuals irrespective of environment.

Country schoolhouses may not be provided with porcelain plumbing and scientific ventilating devices, but there is a long stride throughout the nation in architecture, comfort and convenience since the eight-square log schoolhouse of early days; and if perchance you find here and there some survivors of the day when "the three R's" constituted the school curriculum you will not find one willing to admit that "the old schoolhouse" was not sanitary or that the standard of intelligence was deficient. That was before civilization crossed the Mississippi river.

Most of the really great newspapers of the country, even those counted as having a political bias against him, are patriotically supporting President Wilson in the present controversy with the central powers of Europe over submarine warfare. The fact is the president is right, strongly and irresistibly right, in his stand to maintain the honor of the country he is sworn to serve, a lot of timid time-servers in Congress to the contrary notwithstanding. These gentlemen are found in both parties, just as the brave men who stand with the president in this crisis are found in other parties than his own.
