IS IT A REAL WAR IN MEXICO?

Unmistakably the drift in Mexico is for war with the United States. Many circumstances combine to make our Carranza's personal unpopularity, hatred of the United States, national pride and, on the one hand, the activity of the evil elements and, on the other the passivity of the better classes render our present status in Mexico a temporary makeshift.

The American people will accept with equanimity, if not with joy, a war in Mexico that will settle something. We cannot escape the fact that the capture and execution of Villa and the dispersal of his followers will settle nothing.

The people of the United States have been lenient toward the Mexicans. We have had due regard for their weakness, for their struggles and even for their prejudices, but our patience is exhausted. If, therefore, the Mexican people want war with the United States, the American people will welcome the war as the only adequate solution of the Mexican problem.

able, but it seems to be certain, that the administration has not done what it should for the army, but the blame in this respect is not overwhelming, for in the last analysis the nation is responsible. Our pacific sentiments and our idealistic ignorance of human nature, as revealed by the European war, have prevented us from understanding our military necessities. It is only fair to say that the army is a legacy from other administrations, and even that prodigious warrior, Theodore Roosevelt, appears to have done little or nothing for the army.

Nevertheless we can enter upon the general war, if it comes, with a degree of confidence. We can feel that there will be little interference from the great powers, for all the great powers are at war themselves. We shall have a free hand to do our will in Mexico with the resources at our disposal. And who can doubt the outcome? Once again we shall crush Mexico, no matter what demands it shall make upon us, and we shall do something more. We shall build up an immense army, trained intensively in the ways of modern warfare, and at the end of six months or a year we shall be far better prepared to deal with any other power that may be inclined to war with us than we are today.

WHO WANTS TO BE A MOCCASIN INDIAN?

The remnants of the tribes of Indians still living in the vicinity of Salmon are wearing moccasins just as their ancestors wore them when Lewis and Clark came this way more than a hundred years ago. Even in sleet and snow and rain these primitive people "slush" around in this sort of excuse for footwear.
