In Woman's Realm

Frock of Taffeta Should by All Means Be Included in the Outfit of the Girl Graduate—Dainty Touches That May Be Achieved by the Proper Selection of Pretty and Appropriate Neckwear, of Which There Is Plenty.

Outfitting the girl graduate for the closing of her school days and for her summertime occupations will certainly include providing her with one pretty frock of taffeta. There is no end to the variety in dresses of this kind, but among them all none more suited to a young girl could be found than the simple, cool-looking and graceful model which is shown in the picture.

The straight-hanging skirt is merely four lengths of the silk stitched together and hemmed. It is gathered with a narrow waistband. Two bands of taffeta, about four inches wide, are cut on the straight of the goods and

side turned out, and afterward they are turned down so that only one edge is sewed to the skirt; the lower edge is free. They serve to hold the skirt out from the figure, as fashion demands, as well as to ornament it.

To add the charm of daintiness to the toilette, or to make a plain blouse or dress more attractive, or merely to provide a careful and pretty finish, is the mission of neckwear.

Colored organdies in light tones and tints are used in conjunction with white in borders and frills.

For little capes like that shown in the picture both white and colored or-

edged with a narrow ruffle of the silk. This edging is set on to the band with a small piping and is cut on the bias of the silk.

A plain underbodice of chiffon or crepe has long easy-fitting coat sleeves. The skeleton overbodice is narrowed at the back and front except about the waistline, where the back is joined to the front pieces. It blouses a little and is felled into the belt at the front. There is a wide crushed girdle of the silk, and a

Very wide cuffs of the net are made to match the collar and extend a little way over the hand. The skirt is a little shorter than ankle length. The bands are machine stitched to the skirt with their under-

of the same color as the suit or a combination of two colors. Here again narrow side-plaitings give the malines the requisite body. The plaitings are sewed to a band of narrow ribbon just long enough to reach about the neck. A small ribbon bow and a little nosegay of flowers conceal the fastening of the ruff, or the flowers are sometimes mounted at the side, the ruff fastening with ribbon ties at the front.

SUBMARINE CRISIS APPARENTLY ENDED

GERMANY WILL NOT REPLY TO LAST AMERICAN NOTE CONSIDERING CONTROVERSY CLOSED.

With Apparent End of Submarine Controversy, But One Cause of Friction Remains, the Case of Wolfe von Igel, Bomb Plotter.

Washington.—Germany, considering the submarine controversy with the United States closed, has determined to make no response to the last American note upon the subject. Information to this effect is contained in confidential advices received here from Berlin.

It was indicated at the state department when the note was sent that the United States did not feel a reply was necessary and that should one not be forthcoming, this government would consider Germany had acquiesced.

With the apparent end of the submarine crisis and Germany's admonition to her citizens in the United States to obey local laws, German officials feel that the only remaining cause of friction is the case of Wolfe von Igel, former secretary to the recalled German military attaché, arrested in New York in connection with a plot to blow up the Welland canal.

Count von Bernstorff has asked for the return of papers taken from Von Igel, but the request so far has been refused by the state department.

TAKES CONSERVATIVE STAND.

Mohonk Lake Conference Avoids Radical Recommendations.

Lake Mohonk, N. Y.—The resolutions committee of the Mohonk Lake conference on international arbitration showed its appreciation of the unsettled condition of international affairs by presenting a platform which avoided any radical recommendations and confined itself to carefully worded approval of the general principle of arbitration.

The platform proved a disappointment to members of the League to Enforce Peace, headed by former President William H. Taft, presiding officer of the conference. But it also offered no encouragement to the opponents of enforced peace, led by William J. Bryan.

THREE STATES TO HEAR FROM.

Practically All the Delegates to National Convention Elected.

Chicago.—Secretary James B. Reynolds of the Republican national committee Friday began preparing the temporary roll of delegates to the party's national convention. Delegates from all but three states have been chosen.

May 23 Texas will select its delegation by the convention method and South Dakota will elect its delegates by direct primary.

June 6 West Virginia will elect its delegation by direct primary but there will be only one set of names voted for, as the leaders have agreed to thresh out their factional disputes in a series of primary conventions.

Boiler Explosion Sunk Cymric.

Berlin.—Amsterdam dispatches to the Overseas News agency state that survivors of the British steamship Cymric, which sank on May 9, stated on arriving at Liverpool that the sinking of the vessel was due to the explosion of her boilers.

Baptist Provide Court of Equity.

Minneapolis.—The northern Baptist convention Friday empowered a commission to sit as a court of equity for the adjudication of all differences between affiliated societies and thus bring about more effective co-operation between Baptist organizations of the United States.

Wilson Goes to Charlotte.

Washington.—President Wilson with Mrs. Wilson and a large party, went to Charlotte, N. C., where the president made an address on Saturday at the annual celebration of the Mecklenburg declaration of independence.

Sending Marines to Santo Domingo.

Washington.—Three hundred marines at Norfolk and between 400 and 500 in Haiti were ordered Friday night to Santo Domingo to reinforce the American force policing the little republic.

Sing Sing Doomed.

Albany, N. Y.—A bill authorizing the construction of a new prison to supplant Sing Sing has been approved by Governor Whitman, and retained as a receiving and distributing station.

Mexican Wife Murderer Hanged.

Phoenix, Ariz.—Francisco Rodriguez was hanged at the state penitentiary at Florence at 3:15 o'clock Friday afternoon for the murder of his wife here January 17, 1911. Rodriguez had been reprieved nine times.

Fletcher to Join Navy Board.

Washington.—Admiral Fletcher will be assigned to the navy general board to succeed Rear Admiral Badger, retired, when on June 19 he surrenders command of the Atlantic fleet to Admiral Mayo.
