LEWIS PROPOSES MEDIATION IN WAR

INTRODUCES RESOLUTION REQUESTING PRESIDENT TO TAKE SUCH ACTION.

Resolution Recites That it is Suggested as Expression of a Desire for World Peace and Not Favoritism for Any of Belligerents.

Washington.—A resolution requesting the president, unless incompatible with the public interest, to suggest to warring nations of Europe that the United States undertake mediation was introduced into the senate on Thursday by Senator Lewis of Illinois to lie on the table for discussion later. The resolution would authorize the president to propose that the belligerents declare a truce and that each of them select a neutral country as its representative on a board of arbitration thus created; each selected neutral would name one member of the board over which the president or his representative would preside as referee. Under the plan each belligerent would present its demands or claims to the board, which would be authorized to arrive at an equitable adjustment.

The resolution recites that it is suggested as an expression of the desire for world peace and not of favoritism for any of the belligerents.

President Wilson told callers Thursday that the intervention of a neutral in behalf of peace in Europe could rest only on a mutual understanding by the belligerents that terms to be arranged are to conserve the interests of all and the world at large, rather than those of a particular nation or group of nations among the warring powers.

Defender of Liege Rejects Offer.

Havre.—The German authorities have offered to allow General Leman, the defender of Liege, to go to Switzerland, according to news received here. Because the permission was granted on the ground of his ill health and age, the general rejected the offer, saying that he did not wish to admit that he was unfit to fight for his country.

Would Make Navy Greatest.

Washington.—Republican members of the house naval affairs committee in a minority report submitted to the house Thursday denounced the \$241,000,000 naval appropriation bill reported by the majority as wholly inadequate and urged more liberal allowances to make the United States navy second greatest in the world.

Meets Death in Fire.

Salt Lake City.—Katherine Elizabeth Dahl, aged 3, daughter of Eric Dahl, a farmer of Sandy, was fatally burned in a fire which destroyed the Dahl home Thursday. Mr. Dahl also was seriously burned and his wife, Mrs. Annie Dahl, was likewise burned about the hands and face.

Few Seats Contested.

Chicago.—There will be fewer delegate seats contested in the Republican national convention which meets in the Coliseum June 7 than at any national convention of the party in twenty years.

The senate judiciary committee has recommended confirmation of the nomination of Louis D. Brandeis to the supreme court. It was a strict party vote.


Tornado in North Dakota.

Fargo, N. D.—Six persons were seriously injured and property damage estimated at \$300,000 was done in and around Wimbledon, N. D., in a terrific tornado that passed over that district at 5 a. m. Thursday.

Army Appropriation \$145,000,000.

Washington.—The army appropriation bill carrying \$145,000,000 and including provision for carrying out the Hay-Chamberlain reorganization bill, was agreed to Thursday by the house military committee.

MAKES STATEMENT ON IRISH AFFAIRS

PREMIER ASQUITH APPEALS TO LEADERS FOR SETTLEMENT OF CONTROVERSY.

Announces in House of Commons That David Lloyd-George Has Undertaken Task of Bringing Hostile Factions Together.

London.—The house of commons has rarely seen a demonstration of greater unity than was displayed Thursday afternoon when the leaders of all factions flocked to the standard of the prime minister in an effort to achieve a lasting settlement of the Irish question.

Mr. Asquith's speech took an unexpected turn, for instead of giving details, he made an earnest plea for the settlement of the Irish question by agreement among the contending parties in Ireland and announced that David Lloyd-George had undertaken the delicate task of bringing the hostile factions together.

The premier concluded with an appeal that for a time all debate on the question, both in the house of commons and outside, be suspended, in view of the adverse effect such argument might have in the difficult undertaking facing the government.

The premier's speech was heard with intense interest by the members and he had scarcely resumed his seat when John Redmond, the nationalist leader, arose and acquiesced in the premier's request, adding in a voice, filled with emotion, his ardent desire for a solution of the difficulties of his country.

Mr. Redmond was quickly followed by his political arch enemy, Sir Edward Carson, who tendered his support to the proposition and by the independent Irish leader, William O'Brien, who did likewise. The speeches effectively obliterated party lines for the moment and those members who had come prepared to attack the government fell in with the leaders, and the question was dropped.

Double Murder Revealed.

Portland, Ore.—Finding of the body of Fred Ristman, a Portland chauffeur, engaged to take an unidentified man to the country home of Mrs. Helen Jennings, revealed that Ristman had been beaten to death, presumably by the same man who killed Mrs. Jennings by crushing her skull.

Boy Choked Girl to Death.

Aurora, Ill.—Paul Verboye, 19 years old, was held on a charge of murdering Gwendolyn Holden, 15 years old, daughter of Mrs. Anna Holden Collins, a rooming house keeper. He said he choked the girl to death because he was jealous.

Mrs. Matters Freed.

Chicago.—Mrs. Dolly Ledgerwood Matters and her two co-defendants, charged with conspiracy to foist a spurious heir on the probate court of Cook county, were found not guilty on Thursday.

Casement Indicted.

London.—The grand jury on Thursday returned true bills against Sir Roger Casement, leader of the Sinn Fein revolt, and Daniel J. Bailey, the former British soldier who is held as his accomplice.

Congress to Take Recess.

Washington.—Formal agreement was reached Wednesday by the senate leaders for a practical cessation of legislative activity during the political national conventions. There will be a three-day recess.

Launches Boom for Fairbanks.

Chicago.—Charles W. Fairbanks' presidential boom was brought to Chicago Wednesday by James P. Goodrich, national committeeman and Republican nominee for governor of Indiana.

GREY SAYS PEACE TALK INOPPORTUNE

BRITISH FOREIGN SECRETARY DECLARES PARLEYS IMPOSSIBLE AT PRESENT STAGE.

Hostilities Have Not Reached Stage Where it is Possible to Talk Peace—Reported That von Buelow is on Peace Mission.

London.—In an impromptu speech in the house of commons Wednesday night on the question of peace and the propriety of "employing the American press as a platform," subjects unexpectedly raised by Arthur Ponsonby, Liberal member for Stirling, Scotland, in a strong address, attacking the government for allowing diplomatic etiquette to stand in the way of peace parleys, Sir Edward Grey, the British foreign secretary, set aside all ideas that peace negotiations were possible at the present stage and plainly reiterated that the position of the allies in no way was changed.

Sir Edward declared that it was impossible to consider terms of peace without that a previous agreement between the entente allies. Further he expressed the decided opinion that the hostilities had not yet reached a stage where it was possible to talk of peace, especially as the German public was constantly being "fed with lies" by their ministers.

The Exchange Telegraph company says it learns from diplomatic circles that Prince von Buelow, the former German chancellor, is proceeding to Washington, charged by Emperor William with a special mission.

A rumor that the prince is to visit the United States as a peace delegate is current in diplomatic circles here.

Prince von Buelow, one of the foremost statesmen of Europe, has been referred to frequently in the last few months as the man who might be selected by Emperor William to conduct preliminary peace negotiations should they be undertaken.

Industrial Resources Mobilization.

Washington.—Creation of a national council to mobilize the industrial resources of the country for use in time of war is proposed in a bill, approved by President Wilson, introduced Tuesday in the house.

Porto Rican Bill Passed.

Washington.—The house struck from the Porto Rican bill by a vote of eighty to thirty-nine an amendment designed to grant woman suffrage to the islands. The bill then passed without roll call.
