

## COURT TERM ENDS FOR JUDGE ENSIGN

The district court adjourned yesterday. Jack Browning, Gilmore liquor offender, on his plea of guilty before Judge Ensign, was fined \$80 and costs and allowed to go his way. This was the only criminal business before the court except that Ross Williams was arraigned for felonious assault upon Jack Jones and on a plea of not guilty trial went over to the fall term.

Minor default judgments and continuances made up the balance of the court transactions for the term.

Pearl Barnett was awarded expenses and \$50 per month for maintenance pending the trial of her divorce action against her husband, Charles G. Barnett.

Sarah Spooner True against her father, L. A. Spooner, and the surety company on his guardianship bond was taken under advisement.

So was the appeal of Newton Hibbs and others from the action of the board of county commissioners in the matter of fees and expenses, which was submitted to the court on stipulated facts and agreements.

In the matter of the appeals from orders of the county commissioners, already heard by Judge Cowen, Judge Ensign refused to hear them on a statement from E. W. Whitcomb who told the court that Judge

Cowen had already heard evidence once but had neglected to render judgment, instead of which Cowen had filed an order disqualifying himself in the case. The proceedings were begun six months ago and there is heard much complaint at the long delay in getting action.

Among the important suits to go over was one against the Pipes bank and trust company for the alleged removal from the First national bank building of a vault door claimed as belonging to the bank building.


