Peach Mound.

Soak half a boxful of gelatin in half a cupful of cold water until soft. Boil to a rich syrup one cupful each of sugar and water. Pare some fine ripe peaches and chop fine sufficient to make one and one-half cupfuls of pulp. Take the syrup from the fire, add to it the soaked gelatin, and stir well until it is thoroughly dissolved, then add the peach pulp, mix well, and set aside until cool. Stir it occasionally until it is beginning to thicken well. Beat the whites of four eggs until stiff and add them by degrees to the jellied peach mixture, continuing to whip all together until stiff. Turn into a wetted mold and set on ice until firm. To serve, turn out carefully on a shallow glass dish and heap whipped cream around the base.

Knife Sharpener.

Get a piece of wood ten inches long and three inches wide, six tacks and sheet of No. 0 emery paper. Cut the paper in three pieces lengthwise and turn over the ends of the board, tacking it there to hold it securely. By drawing it over this board a few times any blade from a carver to the small pocket knife may be given a sharp edge. When one layer of paper has lost its usefulness slice it off with a knife and there is another one ready. When all are used by a new sheet of paper and tack on as before.

English Curd Cake.

Line patty pans with good flaky paste, and fill them with the following curd, wherein the secret of their goodness lies: Allow sweet milk to stand where it will soon become quite sour and thick like jelly or blanc-mange. Put this in a very clean pan and bring it to near the boiling point, when the greater portion of it will turn watery. Then let it cool off and drain through cheesecloth, hanging it up in the open air. To each pound of the curd retained in the muslin one or two whisked eggs are added; also a little melted butter, a handful of currants and a few drops of essence of lemon or grated lemon peel.
Fill the paste-lined patties with this mixture and bake them in a good oven. When these are made just right, they delight all lovers of good pastry.
