## BOY BREAKS BOTH WRISTS

Last Friday Wesley Boice, about ten years old, while swinging with other boys in one of the swings of the Central school grounds, fell and broke both wrists. He was attended by Dr. Mitchell who reports the lad getting along nicely. This is the first serious accident that has happened on these swings, to the astonishment of many who have noticed how the children use them, absolutely without any regard for safety, their only thought being to go as high as possible. We understand that School Trustee Early is contemplating having some kind of a safety custom observed that will lessen the danger of the reckless use of these swings. The school trustees meet Monday night.

## ANOTHER GUN PLAY

The injured lad who is about 18 years of age was brought to his home in Blackfoot where the wound, which is not serious, was attended by Dr. Peck. The boy was accidentally shot while an innocent spectator of a row between Dr. Bryant and his rentor, Geo. Brooks, over some harness. The Doc had his rentor covered with a shotgun when Brooks' brother, E. H. Brooks, caught the arms that held the gun when it was unaccountably discharged, striking the disinterested bystander. No arrest had been made up to noon today of the doctor, who had the boys arrested for an assault.

## BUSINESS MEN TO USE THE HIGH SCHOOL GYMNASIUM

Arrangements are under way to make one evening a week a period of amusement and exercise for the business men of the town. In the absence of a Y. M. C. A. building or a public gymnasium where the men of the town may take systematic exercise and a shower bath, an attempt will be made to cover these conditions by opening the high school to the public. Should it become necessary for two evenings in order to accommodate all, this can be adjusted later. It is necessary to provide some sort of exercise that will accomplish at least three essential ends:

1. Not too violent for men who are out of practice in all manner of athletics.
2. It must be of a type that will bring all muscles into play and give the individual enough work to bring out a good sweat.
3. It must have the game element in evidence to an extent that will drive away business thoughts and cares.

After looking over the field of indoor games, especially those which are now being used extensively in the Y. M. C. A. buildings all over the country, there are but two which stand out prominently, viz: indoor baseball and volley ball. The former is limited to a great extent by the number who may take part and at the same time there is not the distraction that one would want. Volley ball offers all the requisites needed to make an indoor sport for business men that is clean, active, and yet not too strenuous.

In order to ascertain just how many men of the town there are who would be interested in an evening at the gymnasium for work in volley ball and a

shower bath, we are asking such men to send word to H. D. MacCosham or W. D. Vincent on or before Wednesday evening, November 17th. There is no age limit, as men of sixty can play the game almost as well as the boy in his late teens. However, if there are enough who would prefer basket ball to volley ball a night for this game will be set apart for the younger men who desire a more active game. In handing in your name you should indicate which game you prefer. As soon as the organization is completed and the men have practiced an invitation to the wives might be extended to cheer and encourage the athletic efforts of the men.

This is a move toward making the school more of a community center and making a greater use of a plant that stands idle a great part of the time. If you are interested in your own physical good and mental efficiency hand in your name at once.
