**BLACKFOOT LAND OFFICE DOES RECORD BUSINESS**

The United States land office at Blackfoot has done a record breaking business in the past year, according to the annual report that has been issued by the Secretary of the Interior. There were 4319 original and final entries upon land amounting to 47,000 acres and final proof was made on 245,000 acres additional, besides patents issued on 197,000 acres of land, making a total of almost 500,000 acres of land in this district that has been handled during the year in the Blackfoot office.

The receipts for the year amount to \$103,000, while the entire expense was \$11,817. It is thought that the bill now before congress permitting 640 acres of grazing land to each person will result in bringing practically all the land in this district under entry within a few years. At present there remains about 3,000,000 acres of land, beside that set aside for government use. The recent ruling which permitted settlers to take up phosphate lands for surface use has greatly stimulated settlement in several parts of the district. Charles Harris, the receiver, expects even a greater business during the next nine months than during the past, as dry farming has become so well established in this section of the state that a rush for lands has been on, which promises to clean up all the unoccupied parts of the district.

**SENT TO ASYLUM FOR PEDDLING DRUGS**

Referring to the conclusion of a case that started in Pocatello a short time ago, the Idaho Falls Post of Saturday says:

Yesterday at Blackfoot Titus Marshall of this city, was, by order of Judge F. J. Cowen, of the Sixth district, committed to the state asylum at that place, because of his intemperate use of narcotics. Recently the legislature passed a law providing for the commitment of intemperate users of intoxicants and narcotics to either of the state's asylums for a period of

two years, unless sooner lawfully discharged. Wherever cured and fit and ready for discharge they are immediately released. It was under this law Mr. Marshall was committed yesterday. It will be remembered that Titus Marshall was arrested in Pocatello some time ago by government agents and charged with a violation of the federal drugs act. The evidence showed a sale and the possession of a large quantity of cocaine. Mr. Marshall spent several weeks in jail at Pocatello as a guest of the government. A few days ago J. Wesley Holden, as Mr. Marshall's attorney, procured his release on bond and yesterday took steps which resulted in his confinement to the Blackfoot institution for cure. It is understood the confinement of Marshall in the state asylum will result in defeating the government's case against him, and that the criminal action of which he is accused will ultimately be dismissed. It is a fortunate solution of the cause for Mr. Marshall.—Pocatello Tribune.
